Directions: Richfield Springs is located near the intersection of Rte 20 and Rte 28. At this intersection follow Rte 20 East to the stoplight in the center of town, which is the intersection with Rte 167. Turn North on Rte 167 (Church Street), the church is one block north on the right. It is a red building with green trim and a steeple. **Take Rte 5S to Mohawk**, go south on Rte 28 to Rte 20 or Rte 5 to Herkimer, south on Rte 28 to Rte 20 and follow the above directions to the church. **If using the Thruway**, go to the Herkimer exit (exit 30) then south on Rte 28 to Rte 20 and follow the above directions to the church. **From the south**, follow Rte 28 north to Rte 20 and follow the above directions to the church.

As genetically modified foods become more popular in the US they have been banned in many countries of Europe and Japan. There is some solid evidence that they do not meet the nutritional needs we all have though they are usually high yielding and disease resistant. As we all want to eat the foods that will make us healthier it is good to watch for organic and foods that have not been genetically modified. Some states, including Connecticut are requiring manufacturers to tell on their labels whether the ingredients are genetically modified. Look for NON GMO project verified labels on packages to be sure.

Many of the Church World Service kits are being used in refugee camps near the Syrian conflict now.

Europe has banned pesticides linked to bee deaths, but the US hasn't acted. Information comes from Green America.

The debate on fracking continues and there is strong evidence it is not good for the environment or the people living nearby.

We are helping others when we buy from people who are paid a fair wage, such as fair trade items. Fast food workers who earn about \$7.50 are asking for a \$15 an hour wage. It wouldn't increase costs much on a food items, and would have a big difference in the workers lives as well as increase the economy with the other things the workers buy.

Welcome to a new year of fellowship with other women in PC(USA) Churches. It is important for us Presbyterian women to gather and communicate, to encourage each other in our Christian faith and to demonstrate our faith together in service.

You may be a PW group, a mission association, or a woman's fellowship. However you label yourselves, the Presbyterian Women of the Utica Presbytery would like to hear what your local group has been doing so we can encourage each other and share ways we can be in service in the name of Christ. Many groups prepare health or school kits for Church World Service to distribute to those in need. Women from the Utica and Cayuga-Syracuse Presbyteries brought many items to the Retreat at Vanderkamp to assemble CWS School Kits. How good it was to see those boxes of kits taken to the CWS office ready to be distributed. Many of us also prepared school kits in our own churches. It will be good to know how many kits we send all together – every one adds up. So let me know. Some churches have, or send women to work in, soup kitchens, some groups sew or collect items for mission houses, and some work on fund raisers for local or regional causes, or to support children around the world. Please share what YOU do, so we can encourage each other, pray for each other and for the missions we support, and give each other ideas for other ways we can serve. Also, let us know if there are projects on which we can collaborate and multiply our effectiveness.

Another activity for Church World Service you might consider is to hold an Alternative Gift Fair in which people select symbolic gifts for family members or friends with a gift to CWS. For example, you might decide to give \$25 for "Educational Toys" to honor a teacher. Church World Service will send you a packet with a poster, their Best Gift catalog, gift cards, and information on these meaningful gifts. Go to www.cwsbestgifts.org to order materials or to learn more. This would be a great after church Advent activity or a great addition to your Christmas Bazaar.

I'd like to remind you that our PW is a member of Bread for the World. This organization "is a collective Christian voice urging our nation's decision makers to end hunger at home and abroad.

God's grace in Jesus Christ moves us to help our neighbors, whether they live in the next house, the next state, or the next continent." www.bread.org

Bread for the World asks us as concerned citizens to write letters to our Congress members to encourage maintaining programs that provide a circle of protection around our less fortunate brothers and sisters in our country and around the world. Once again our government is making crucial budget decisions, so now would be a good time to write to our representatives asking them to remember "the least of these".

RECIPE TO SHARE – From the Retreat at Vanderkamp by Jan Whiting

Cheese Ball

1 8 oz. package of cream cheese, room temp

1 8oz bag shredded cheddar cheese

½ cup crumbled bleu cheese

2 tsp grated onion

a little chopped green pepper

1 tsp Worcestershire sauce

1 tsp lemon juice

salt

Add all ingredients mix well and roll ball in chopped nuts or parsley.

CHILL and serve with crackers

Ghirardelli Ultimate - Double Chocolate Cookies


1 bag (11.5 0z) Ghirardelli 60% cocoa Bittersweet Chocolate Chips 6 Tbls unsalted butter 3 eggs 1 cup sugar 1/3 cup flour ½ tsp baking powder 1 bag (12 oz) Ghir. Semi Sweet Chocolate Chips 1 cup (4oz) chopped walnuts

In a double boiler over hot water, melt bittersweet choc. chips and butter. In large bowl with electric mixer beat eggs and sugar until thick, stir together flour and baking powder, stir into chocolate mix. Gently mix in chocolate chips and walnuts.

Using a sheet of plastic wrap, form dough into two logs, each 2 inches in diameter and about 8 inches long, As dough will be very soft, use plastic wrap to hold dough in log shape. Wrap tightly. Refrigerate at least an hour or until firm.

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. Unwrap dough, cut with sharp knife into ¾ inch slices. Place slices 1½ inches apart on greased baking or parchment lined cookie sheet. Bake 12-14 minutes or until shiny crust forms on top but still stays soft in the middle. Cool on baking sheet. Enjoy the moment of timeless pleasure. Makes 2 dozen.

II. Individual donation. Yes, you may obtain single copies of *Legacy Christmas* outside consignment for a minimum \$15.00 (each CD) donation.
