"Well, if you wait long enough, good things will happen"

You may recall that, a year ago, a group of Presbyterian Women volunteers, including Churchwide Coordinating Team members, staff and women from PW in presbyteries and synods, traveled to New Orleans to continue the rebuilding process undertaken by the Presbytery of South Louisiana and St. Charles Avenue Presbyterian in the wake of Hurricane Katrina. (In March of this year, a PW national mission team returned to New Orleans and the Presbytery of South Louisiana for the fifth time since Katrina. See photo, below right.)

In 2011, volunteers worked on two homes in New Orleans, one of which was projected to be completed in a matter of weeks. More than a year later, that home was dedicated. Kathy

The Phillipses told PW volunteers who were there in January 2011 to help rehab the home that the cross was hung as a sign of faith, as a message to those who had vandalized the worksite repeatedly that the homeowners had faith in Christ, and sustained hope in the recovery of the city and its people from the damage of Hurricane Katrina.

Randall, Gathering Planning Team chair and New Orleans resident, said "This has been a long road for these folks."

Kathy wrote on March 31:

Well, if you wait long enough, good things happen!

Yesterday was a glorious day for Project Homecoming and homeowners John and Minnie Phillips in New Orleans.

You recall the long wait the New Orleans couple had to return to the home you worked on last spring. They had one horrible thing after another happen with repairs and inspections. This might be the longest repair period of a home in the five-plus years of recovery—vandalism, theft and weather all contributed to the delays.

Yesterday, their home was dedicated. The CCT/PW team working on the Phillips' home in January last year was certainly thanked in a big way for their efforts to help restore the Phillips' home. An overflow crowd met in John and Minnie's living room, kitchen and dining area to enjoy the celebration. Scripture was read and gifts were presented. But the first item was to thank national Presbyterian Women for their continued support . . . even a year-plus later. The ceremony was followed by fried chicken, red beans and rice, salad and sheer joy, all prepared by Minnie.

Hundreds of volunteers through Presbyterian Disaster Assistance and Project Homecoming helped in the ongoing work that was finished yesterday.

New devotional booklet (available online) lifts up plight of Europe's largest minority

Presbyterian Women has again partnered with World Mission to produce a booklet of prayer and thanksgiving for the Roma people, in observation of International Day of the Roma (April 8, 2012).

Who are the Roma? The Roma are the largest minority group in Europe. Sometimes pejoratively known as Gypsies, the Roma people frequently are victims of deep impoverishment,

toxic living situations (the Roma are often forced to reside in environmentally inhospitable locations), hate crimes, human trafficking, and an overall lack of access to adequate education and health care.

The devotional is the second produced by PW and World Mission to lift up the plight of the Roma people. 

These baskets are so versatile, they are always in style! You might plan to visit sick community members this year, bearing baked items for good cheer. Filling a Roma-made basket with goodies is truly an expression of hope and support for this promising business.

Put one on your dresser or by your door to catch earrings, keys, coins and other trinkets of daily life that might fall prey to the family cat otherwise.

Keep one on your dining room table full of edible fruit or on your living room console full of decorative fruit to enhance your decor.

Attending on a shoestring?

- Ask your church to sponsor a fundraiser to send a PW (you?) to the Gathering.
- Share a suite (three or four in a suite is cheaper than two in a regular room, since you can use a rollaway bed in the suite—be sure to reserve the rollaway, too. Rates for suites are the same for up to four occupants; rollaways are free to the first 100 who request them. Call early!)

- Eat breakfast at Java Coffee Shop; their breakfast sandwich tastes great and is reasonably priced (around \$5).

Wanted: Donations for Churchwide Gathering's silent auction to benefit Presbyterian Women Offerings

A silent auction will be held at the 2012 Churchwide Gathering, with all proceeds benefiting the PW Mission Pledge, Birthday Offering or Thank Offering. Even if you're not attending, you (or your PW group) can donate items, and select which of the three giving opportunities your donation should benefit.

Circles, congregations, presbyteries and/or synods can donate new items (nothing used, please) for the auction. Items should have a minimum value of \$50. Smaller items with a combined

total value of \$50 can be grouped. Crafts and artisan items are welcome. Items should be small and light enough to fit in suitcases. If not, the donating group is responsible for shipping costs.

To arrange for your item to be included in the auction, submit the form that is available at www.presbyterian women.org/gathering by June 15, 2012.

The auction will open at 10 AM on July 18 and close on July 20 at 7 PM. Items may be picked up on July 21 between 1:30 PM and 4 PM. Bid sheets will be available for each item. A minimum bid

amount will be set, and bidders must bid this amount to start the bidding. Bidding continues in minimum increments as set for each item (e.g., \$5). The person with the highest bid at the end of the auction will receive the item. Winning bidders are responsible for getting the item to its final destination, whether carrying or shipping.

Antiracism Committee introducing two resolutions to the 2012 Churchwide Business Meeting of PW

Some say that the young Martin Luther King Jr., who had just relocated to Montgomery, Alabama, to become the pastor of a local Baptist church, would not have stood up to lead the bus boycott had Rosa Parks not insisted on staying seated on December 1, 1955.

For the second year in a row, the CCT's Antiracism Committee met at the Highlander Research and Education Center where Rosa Parks attended a workshop on race relations only months before her arrest, which sparked the Montgomery bus boycott. This time, several members of ARC even participated in the Racial Ethnic Dialog meeting that took place immediately before the ARC meeting. Additionally, members of both groups participated in a half-day dialog facilitation training led by Frances Frazier, senior consultant of

Everyday Democracy, who has provided facilitator leadership for the Dialog during this triennium.

While celebrating the legacies of Martin Luther King Jr., Rosa Parks, and hundreds of others, many of whom are Presbyterians who have tirelessly fought for racial justice, both groups realize that we have to continue the fight because the Promised Land is yet to come.

Therefore, the Antiracism Committee has introduced two resolutions to the 2012 Business Meeting: 1. To reaffirm PW's commitment to building an inclusive and caring community of women; and 2. To commend the 2003 Structural Review Task Group's report to PW groups. The 2003 report had recommended that "this report be commended to every PW to read,

study and implement the recommendation in her community. involving an outward manifestation as well as an expression of each woman's heart." ARC calls upon every Presbyterian woman to take this recommendation to heart and make it an important part of her individual faith journey as well as PW's collective faith journey. ARC also encourages you to take advantage of the educational opportunities offered at the 2012 PW Gathering concerning racial justice. Three workshops offered in this area are: White Privilege: What Is It and How Can Presbyterian Women Respond? (No. 22), All Together Now in Christ: PC(USA) Edition (No. 33), and Building and Nurturing Diversity in PW Leadership (No. 36). Come and visit the ARC booth in the exhibit area also!

Creative Ministries Offerings

Twenty-seven projects selected to receive grants from the 2011 Thank Offering of Presbyterian Women

"Clothe yourself with compassion" (Colossians 3:12) is the theme chosen by the Creative Ministries Offering Committee for the 2012 Thank Offering. Presbyterian Women will be awarding nearly \$700,000 to 27 applicants that include 13 national, each from a different state, plus 14 international projects representing 11 countries. The funds were received from the 2011 offering.

Since 1888 Presbyterian women have thankfully given to fund mission programs throughout the world through the Thank Offering. This year the Thank Offering will support programs to provide clean water, just treatment of women, education, safe housing, help prisoners and much more.

The Creative Ministries Committee is comprised of seven women from the Churchwide Coordinating Team and two women from General Assembly Mission Council. The committee met in March to choose the 27 recipients from 70 applications. It was through the moving of the Holy Spirit that the committee was able to make the difficult choices. Specific criteria are used in considering applicants: whether the applicant has received a previous grant, what percentage of the funding will go toward salaries, whether they have sent Presbyterian references, whether volunteers are being used in the projects and whether funding is being sought from other sources.

Even though our challenge of \$900,000 was not met for the Thank Offering this past year, our challenge goal remains the same. We pray that the hearts and minds of women will be opened to spreading the word about the Thank Offering and to giving to families and children in need as we have all been blessed.

Sisters Stand and Walk Together, Takin' It to the Congregations key to PW leadership enhancement

In the quarterly newsletter of October 2010-January 2011, the Leadership Enhancement Committee (LEC) featured two of its key projects: Sisters Stand and Walk Together and Takin' It to the Congregations. Both projects continue as integral components of leadership enhancement within Presbyterian

The Takin' It to the Congregations leadership training gave synod participants tools to help congregations (PWCs) assess their current situations, discover why programs may no longer be effective, identify changes that are needed, set new directions and work in new ways to engage more women.

Participants in the Takin' It to the Congregations training in September 2010 are invited to a reunion following the Thursday evening plenary session on July 19, 2012, at the Churchwide Gathering. We have reserved a room where we can meet to discuss the status of the training in your synod. We reviewed your feedback from the initial training as well as subsequent updates and we are looking forward to talking with you. Others interested in leadership are invited to attend as well. Come and tell us your stories, your successes and frustrations. The information

you share with members of LEC during this session will help set the direction of our training efforts during the next three years.

The Sisters Stand and Walk Together project that is designed to develop leadership potential in racial ethnic and immigrant women has been carried out in four synods so far since it was initiated by the PW in the Synod of Northeast in 2004.

This project will span four triennia if PW, at its 2012 Business Meeting, approves the recommendation of LEC to set expanding the initiative as a leadership development priority for the 2012–2015 triennium. The recommendation follows LEC's recent review of the three grant recipients' progress in implementing the program within their synods of Mid-

Atlantic, South Atlantic and Pacific. All three synods successfully implemented the project. A forum on this wonderful project is scheduled at 11 AM on Thursday, July 19, 2012 at the Churchwide Gathering. PW continues conversations with churches in Sudan By Mary Cook Jorgenson

In March of this year, I participated as a representative of Presbyterian Women on a PC(USA)-led trip to South Sudan. The purpose of this trip was to continue conversations with our brothers and sisters in the Sudanese Presbyterian Evangelical Church (SPEC) headquartered in Khartoum, Sudan, and with the Presbyterian Church of Sudan (PCOS) headquartered in Malakal, South Sudan.

As they struggle daily with the aftermath of a continuing civil war, interethnic violence, and food and water insecurity. it is important that we hear their stories of faith and hope and stand with them as a community of believers.

We also had the opportunity to speak with the women from Pibor and Akobo who were involved in the 2010 workshop conducted by RECONCILE, an ecumenical peace building organization initiated by the New Sudan Council of Churches (and a 2009 Thank Offering recipient). The workshop was financed in part through the generosity of Presbyterian Women. It is disheartening to know that just a few months after the workshop that offered so much promise for peacemaking among the Nuer and Murle tribes, violence is once again a too-common occurrence. But the women from both communities voiced a strong desire to continue the work of reconciliation and hoped to be able to continue their work to build a peace together.

This was the most difficult trip that I have taken—physically, emotionally and spiritually. I hope I'll have the opportunity to return.

Presbyterian Women participates in 56th UN Commission on the Status of Women

The 2012 CSW theme was "The empowerment of rural women and their role in poverty and hunger eradication, development and current challenges."

Every year, thousands of members of nongovernmental organizations (NGOs)—both faith-based and not—gather during the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women (UN CSW). Groups exert tremendous amounts of energy to influence Commission outcome documents, and to enforce the resolutions and conventions on which UN member states have agreed. Members of these groups work to impact political processes, tell their stories and share their lives.

Presbyterian Women and the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) participate in the UN CSW through the office of Presbyterian Ministry at the UN (PMUN) (www.pcusa.org/un).

The CCT's Justice and Peace Committee and PW's churchwide moderator keep CSW before PW at the national level and work to include women throughout the organization. Meagan Manas, PW justice and peace program specialist, staffs the committee and supports this national effort.

Ecumenical Women

PW and the PC(USA) are part of a coalition called Ecumenical Women at the United Nations. Ecumenical Women is an international coalition of church denominations and ecumenical organizations that have status with the UN Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC). Grounded in faith and a commitment to global justice, Ecumenical Women trains and empowers an expanding network to advocate for gender equality at the United Nations.

Ecumenical Women not only provides a network of collaborators who amplify all of our voices, it also provides critical theological reflection on how faith and justice interact, and why

we advocate at the UN as people of faith. Through Ecumenical Women, arrangements are made for worship services that occur every morning during the two weeks of CSW.

PW's future with UN CSW

In July, voting representatives to the Churchwide Business Meeting of Presbyterian Women will consider a resolution to recommend that Presbyterian Women apply to the UN for association status and consultative status, which combined would allow PW to gain increased access to official CSW meetings as a registered nongovernmental organization, and effectively double the PC(USA)'s presence at CSW. Updates will be reported as information becomes available.

PW attends Ecumenical Advocay Days in Washington, D.C., March 23–26, 2012

Washington, D.C., was a glorious sight this spring. Not only was the town in bloom but Ecumenical Advocacy Days (EAD) was there. There were more than 750 people, from every state and Puerto Rico, representing 50 denominations, and including a large group of Presbyterians.

The focus of the conference was to advocate for a more faithful budget. A faithful budget asks us to financially prioritize "loving our neighbors as ourselves" as we look for solutions to budget crises. "Budget crisis" means different things to different people. For example, the United States spends over \$100 billion on wars each year, and if spending and tax rates continue at current levels, the cost of these wars plus the effects of tax cuts will account for nearly half our national debt by 2019.²

The Faithful Budget Campaign urges lower military spending and encourages shared responsibility of all Americans through more equitable tax rates. Our focus at EAD Lobby Day was to tell our representatives not to cut the social benefits of the poor and to find more equitable ways of balancing the budget.

It was emphasized at the conference that changes necessary to bring about a more faithful budget, and to address environmental, health, hunger, clean water, clean air, renewable energy, voter registration, prison reform and other issues must have grassroots support.

After returning home, I thought about what I could do to make a difference. I started with voter registration in my county. I went to the county courthouse, learned how to register people and took 100 registration cards. At a local food pantry, I registered five people in a few hours. I also decided to ask

people to sign a petition to add a proposal for clean, renewable energy to the ballot in Missouri, which is 48th of the states on clean energy. I am drafting a letter to my congresspeople for a more "faithful budget." I also called eight state congressmen to stop the CAFOs (contained animal feeding operations) from polluting my state.

What can you do to make a difference? Many, many things. Write or call your congressional representatives, for starters. Tell them not to balance the budget on the backs of the poor, but to keep all of the social programs for the poor in place. Tell them you want a more equitable tax rate and the wealthy should pay their share. Tell them the rate of military spending is outrageous. Get involved.
