First annual PW Together in Action Day held January 11 on Human Trafficking Awareness Day



January 11, 2013, was Human Trafficking Awareness Day and the first annual PW Action Day! How did your group observe

CCT moderator Mary Jorgenson reports that 20 women, ages 4 weeks to 91 years, gathered at her church, Southminster Presbyterian Church (Heartland Presbytery), to observe this day. She said, "We had two gatherings—a morning gathering with coffee and a late afternoon gathering with cocktails (optional)—both social opportunities to get together, complete advocacy postcards, learn about online advocacy and check out our slavery footprint at www.slavery footprint.org." Her church also held a series of four Sunday school classes in January on human trafficking.

Other PW activity around this day and this issue

- Several Facebook friends on PW's Facebook page shared links to resources like the Toolkit for Action: Modern Slavery, produced by the PC(USA)'s Human Trafficking Roundtable (downloadable from www.presbyterian mission.org/ministries/human-trafficking), and the quiz at slaveryfootprint.org.
- The Albany PWP scheduled a speaker on the subject of human trafficking for their next gathering.
- Ann Waddle's church's youth group has an ongoing project called Sow Love and sells t-shirts to raise funds.
- Wasilla First Presbyterian Women had a presentation given by Waverli Rainey, one of the church's college students.
- PW members at Calvin Presbyterian Church, Zelienpole, Pennsylvania, are putting together a movie/educational night to increase awareness of human trafficking!
- PW from San Diego to Santa Barbara met at Pasadena Presbyterian Church to hear a keynote speaker and hold a roundtable discussion on the trafficking of girls for sexual exploitation.
- Sue Kimball's group started its PW meeting with a reading from the PC(USA)'s web pages. They will be using PC(USA) resources in a church school class in April and May.
- First Presbyterian Church in Grapevine did several things to observe this day. A churchwide email was sent to every member, a website notification was highlighted, Facebook entries were made. Human trafficking was lifted up during prayer time on Sunday. Sunday evening, the church held a dinner with Leslie and Cynthia Morgan, mission coworkers in Bangladesh. During this dinner they talked about Rahab's Rope and how India is the number one country for trafficking. Nancylee Hadley, Rahab's

Rope mission advocate, told about one of the brothels she visited in Mumbai. There she met a lady 62 years old who had been trafficked at age six and had never been off that property her whole life. The woman was from Bangladesh. The Morgans highlighted the problem that Banaladesh has with trafficking in the garment industry. where slave labor and child labor is a major problem.

PW Together in Action Day was co-created by the Mission Relationships and the Justice and Peace committees of the Churchwide Coordinating Team. The idea behind this day is that once a year Presbyterian women around the country will join in taking action on an issue that is important to them. One of the issues important to Presbyterian women is human trafficking. Therefore, the CCT committees chose it as the issue of focus for the first annual PW Action Day.

Super Storm Sandy's impact felt in the Synod of the Northeast

In late October 2012, Super Storm Sandy battered communities in the northeast—New York, New Jersey and Connecticut. The storm came with powerful winds and rain that caused massive flooding and knocked down trees and power lines; it affected more than eight million people.

Virginia Champlin, CCT Search Committee moderator, lives in Geneva, New York. She said: "The week after Sandy hit, our synod PW had a leadership/coordinating team meeting and there were women who could not get out of New York City and New Jersey to attend. There were women who came and were grateful for a hot shower and hot meals. My end of the synod just had minor damage. Those who attended our meeting said that they were grateful for Church World Service."

Maggie Lewis, CCT representative from the Synod of the Northeast, shared her experience:

Though no one in my community of Jamacia, New York, lost their homes, tens of thousands of homes in New York state were damaged. A fire destroyed more than 100 homes in Breezy Point, Queens. Millions of people were ordered to evacuate their homes, many of which were ultimately destroyed. Hospitals were evacuated after they lost electricity. People in my community were without utilities for at least seven days. I am happy to report that my home was not damaged, but my community did experience flood damage, fallen trees and loss of utilities. Just half an hour's drive from me, homes were destroyed. Many downed trees have yet to be removed.

The tidal surge sent seawater flowing into large parts of the New York City subway system. The New York City subway is a lifeline for millions who were paralyzed by the flooded tunnels; the subways remained silent for several days. The subway system is 108 years old but had never experienced a disaster like Sandy.

Shelters were set up in community centers and schools, including York College in Queens. Some families even offered their homes. Throughout this disaster, people in the affected communities were and continue to be supportive of one another. We have many volunteers working in our communities, including from other parts of the United States. My church responded to some of the needs. We donated clothes, blankets and food, and volunteered at shelters. We have also committed to support Far Rockaway Presbyterian Church, which was damaged.

During the storm, I tried not to panic, but the day after, as I sat and reflected on the aftermath, I thought of those families without electricity, heat, water and even shelter. Had I been taking basic necessities for granted? I remember that life has not always been as convenient as it is now. Seventy-five years ago, not everyone had running water, electricity and central heating; our God provided for us then and will continue to do so. I grew up on a farm, and my parents provided for us without all the modern day essentials. I think this made it easier for me to deal with the storm.

Since Sandy, I have continued to volunteer my time. A group of us, including church members, cleaned out

a church that was damaged by Sandy. At the end of the day, I felt like I had been in worship service (minus the singing, praying and reading of scripture). We were doing God's work without even a word said. After the storm I thought about the scripture in Matthew 8:23–27: "And when [Jesus] got into the boat, his disciples followed him. A gale arose on the

lake, so great that the boat was being swamped by the waves; but he was asleep. And they went and woke him up, saying, 'Lord, save us! We are perishing!' And he said to them, 'Why are you afraid, you of little faith?' Then he got up and rebuked the winds and the sea; and there was a dead calm. They were amazed, saying, 'What sort of man is this, that even the winds and the sea obey him?'"

In addition to volunteers, Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, FEMA, the Red Cross, Food Bank, the NYPD Community Affairs Bureau, churches and many more organizations contributed to relief and recovery efforts. To the best of my knowledge, this assistance has met the needs of this community, but there is still need for housing for the people whose homes were damaged or destroyed.

Additional federal relief on its way

The New York Times reported on January 21, 2013, that recovery in the wake of Sandy has been spotty. After weeks of delay, the House of Representatives finally agreed on January 15 on a \$50.5 billion aid package that would help communities rebuild. As this newsletter went to press, the package was stalled in the Senate over filibuster negotiations. It is hoped that the Senate will act immediately to ensure that communities get the help they need. Many are still strugaling.

Super Storm Sandy: Relief Operations Survey

The Interfaith Center of New York and related New York-based organizations says, "The response to Super Storm Sandy in New York City has clearly demonstrated that congregations, faith-based and neighborhood partnerships and our nonprofit partners form the backbone of disaster relief and recovery. It is critical for us to illuminate the vital role that our sector has played and will continue to play in NYC disaster preparedness, response and recovery. However, the scale of Sandy's impact has made it challenging to locate and network effectively with all the resources available to affected families, congregations and other relief and recovery organizations. And so we seek to strengthen our impact by sharing solid information, leveraging our resources and enhancing our partnerships."

This group is conducting a survey to document the services that New York City congregations, as well as faith-based and neighborhood partnerships and other nonprofit organizations provided in response to Super Storm Sandy during the first 60 days of relief efforts. Help PW move toward justice—implement recommendations, utilize online resources, share successes

Presbyterian Women's churchwide antiracism committee (ARC) held its annual meeting at the Highlander Research and Educational Center in New Market, Tennessee, on October 13–16, 2012.

Highlander Center was founded by Myles Horton, a Cumberland Presbyterian, to address systemic problems of poverty and injustice in 1932. Highlander was shut down a few times mainly because it brought together whites and blacks to work for justice, including racial justice, during the time when segregation was the law. I have heard it said, "Martin Luther would not have stood up if Rosa Parks did not sit down." Rosa Parks attended a Highlander workshop on fighting segregation only months before her refusal to give up her seat sparked the year-long Montgomery boycott. Meeting in such sacred, historic space was a formidable experience for ARC. We felt surrounded by a cloud of witnesses.

This time, the focus of ARC's work was examining PW's mission through the lens of race, paying particular attention to the relationship between the giver and the receiver. Thomas Priest, a candidate for teaching elder from the Presbytery of Detroit, facilitated the process. ARC will be sharing what it has learned with the Mission Relationships Committee; the two committees will be working jointly to help PW's mission move beyond charity toward justice and mutual transformation. ARC recommends Faith in Action: Understanding Development Ministries from a Christian Perspective, PDS 74-400-00-022; \$15 plus shipping.



Presbyterian Women's leaders adapt to changing environment


If you haven't ordered your "PW Leaders Adapt" buttons, you may do so through the PW marketing office (carissa. herold@pcusa.org or jung.winner@pcusa.org). The buttons are available free as long as finances permit. Consider ordering them for your next gathering.

Why the buttons? What is adaptive leadership? Adaptive leadership seeks to solve challenges that defy traditional problem solving. For example, we have been trying for years to bring more women into PW. We have tried changing our meeting times and meeting days. We have varied our programs. These are considered technical changes. We continue to lose members. This is why we need to learn adaptive leadership. Adaptive leadership requires experimentation, acquiring new knowledge and changing attitudes, values and behaviors. Examples of adaptive changes PW has made are hiring a funds development specialist and joining the Women's Funding Network.

In July 2011, the churchwide Leadership Enhancement Committee (LEC) sent two of its members to adaptive leadership training at Montreat Conference Center. LEC recommended and the CCT concurred that we have a training session as early as possible during this triennium.

Adaptive change is not easy, and the leadership it requires means developing and using a different mindset than we might have used in the past. When we employ adaptive techniques, we often must turn up the pressure on an organization and allow conflict to exist rather than rush to keep everyone comfortable. It requires us to look at the big picture. Ron Heifitz, a noted expert on adaptive leadership and a Harvard scholar, calls this "getting on the balcony." This, he explains, is like looking at a dance floor from above so that you see the whole floor rather than the limited portion you see from the dance floor.

Another key element of adaptive work is that all levels of the organization must be involved and committed to the change for it to be effective. Adaptive leadership can be exercised at any level, and it does not require one to have an official position or to be in charge. How might you and your PW group use adaptive leadership to thrive and grow?

Unto These Hills—USA Mission Experience 2013

"Unto These Hills" is the theme for the 2013 USA Mission Experience, June 18–26, 2013. Participants will learn about the realities of life in Appalachia and visit church-related and sponsored ministries that respond to the needs of the people living in Eastern Tennessee and Western North Carolina.
