On Sunday, May 3, 2015 at 3 p.m. the Rev. Terri Yvette Ofori was commissioned as Chaplain at Bloomfield College in Bloomfield, NJ. Terri is one of our own, currently serving as Chaplain to Presbyterian Women in the Synod of the Northeast (PWSNE). She is also the Moderator of Presbyterian Women of Long Island as well as the Interim Pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Levittown in NY. A busy lady, she has served several churches as interim and worked in other phases of the Presbyterian Church. Terri and her husband Elder Dr. David Ofori, Jr. together serve as co-directors of P.A.Y.L.A. (Pan African Youth Leadership Academy) in NYC. It is a non-profit dedicated to providing academic and leadership development skills to at risk youth.

The day—sunny, bright and warm—was perfect for this festive occasion. The commissioning was hosted by Bloomfield Church on the Green. Many leaders from around the Synod of the Northeast participated: Jo Ann Burrell, Presbyterian Women in the Synod of the Northeast's Vicemoderator (and Terri's friend); the Rev. Kathy Nealand, past-Moderator Synod of the Northeast, as well as now on PWSNE's Search Committee



and Secretary/Public Relations of PWP Long Island; the Rev. Dr. Harold Delhagen, Synod Leader; the Rev. Nancy Talbot, Stated Clerk of the Synod of the Northeast; the Rev. Dr. Robert Foltz-Morrison; Executive Presbyter of NYC; Elder Warren McNeil, Stated Clerk of Newark Presbytery; and last, but not least, Terri's husband, Elder Dr. David Ofori Jr. Other participants included ministers and representatives of Bloomfield College as well as many of Terri's friends and family.

Terri said, "On this day I wanted to be surrounded by my Presbyterian Sisters." Indeed she was. Besides Jo Ann Burrell and the Rev. It was a day of blessings not only for Terri, but for all our PW sisters. Terri said, "My mother was so touched by your out pouring of love." She said to me: "I really like these ladies. I am so glad you have them as an extended family."

Yes, we are sisters walking together. We are springs of living water bringing new life to women.

Memories of PW

Note from Sandy Grillo: Here is the next installment of Memories of PW. I am very proud to count Hazel Fuhrmeister as a friend. I asked her if she could help me in this project and the essay below is what she wrote. I am including it in its entirety as I think it is perfect just like it is. Please read our former Synod Moderator's (and former Churchwide Moderator) thoughts on being involved in Presbyterian Women. You will see why she is so beloved by us all. We are very blessed to have Hazel among us. She is one special lady.

SO MANY MEMORIES

After more than 50 years in Presbyterian Women, most of all, I remember the people. This is about just some of them.

Fresh in my memory are the 92 year old woman who had been president of her women's group for 45 years "because nobody else would do it," and the young woman who carried her infant son to PW Gatherings because she didn't want to miss any of it.

I remember being made welcome in homes from one end of the country to another. Being part of the family, baby-sitting more than once, entertaining small children who had more energy than I ever had. I remember homes where all the family had commitments and I was left alone with a thoughtfully provided meal to heat in the microwave. I remember a Sunday dinner in Puerto Rico with the large extended family sharing the baked chicken and rice prepared by my hostess. I remember a home in Beirut where the hostess, her mother and her sisters prepared a delicious meal of Lebanese specialties for all our Global Exchange group, then gave us time to use her computer to send messages home. I can't forget the young Thai pastor who invited our Global Exchange group to her father's house. We protested that she couldn't do that to her father, only to be told that he owned a restaurant so cooking fabulous food for 35 was easy for him. There was the home of a PW leader without a spare room where space was found for me on a sofa bed in the den, somewhat to the dismay of the husband and son of the family who needed some things from the den despite the strange woman sleeping in there. In the Synod of the Rocky Mountains, one of my hostesses was a young woman I had met when she was active here in the Northeast. At Ghost Ranch in New Mexico I learned that it's not smart to run up a even small hill at that altitude.

Never to be forgotten are those I met the week that I spoke at 6 PWP Gatherings in 4 days, being shuttled from one to the next, usually arriving just in time for the program to begin, and flying home from the last stop carrying pancake mix and syrup, specialties of the region. A lovely Pennsylvania woman who always wore her sari and taught us about her home in India. The Native American women at their National Gathering at Cook School in Arizona. The Korean Women at their Gathering in Los Angeles. The Japanese women who had been interned with their families during WWII, one of whom walked the tunnels of Corregidor with her arm in mine, remembering family members who had fought there with the Japanese Army. The people of Warsaw, Berlin, Prague and other cities behind the Iron Curtain who had lived through so much more during the war than I had in Britain.

I remember the General Assembly Council members who helped bring the overture to restore Voice and Vote for PW to the floor of the Assembly, and the Presbyterians across the denomination who worked to pass the overture in their presbyteries. I'm grateful for all the teaching elders who supported, encouraged and enabled our work. We were aided by the staff who served PW professionally, carrying out our plans and making us look good. At home I leaned on my wonderful children, the friend who took my 90 year old mother out several times a week while I was away, the families who invited my husband over while I was gone, and my travel agent who happened to be a fellow choir member.

I remember with gratitude those who were my spiritual guides, those who taught me how to lead, those who accepted responsibility when asked, those who honored me by accepting my leadership, those who encouraged me, those who have remained my friends long after our PW terms expired.

Everyone is remembered lovingly and with the prayer that they are as blessed as I am.

Recommended Reads

If you are looking for a high adventure type of book for end of summer reading, **ARK FEVER** is the book for you! Not only does it provide historical and Biblical perspective, but author, former policeman, and avid expeditionist Robert Cornuke includes maps, colored photographs and chapter notes relevant to his passionate quest to make the greatest archeological discovery in human history, that of finding the remains of Noah's ark.

"Ark fever" hit Cornuke hard, and he spent twenty years looking for this monumental Biblical relic. He braved treacherous mountain climbs, escaped political unrest, was forced to drink polluted water or die of dehydration, and survived threats of being shot by Kurdish guerillas. This is a fascinating piece of non-fiction that reads like a novel. Written in the first-person, the author makes the reader feel a part of the expeditionary team, setting up camp, trudging to the heights, and viewing massive pieces of rock hoping to find pieces of THE ark.

Read this compelling account to find out what happened during the years of searching. Cornuke presents amazing evidence throughout his travels in the mountain ranges of Turkey and Iran. He holds a PhD in Bible & Theology from Louisiana Baptist University and serves as founder and president of the Bible Archeology search and Exploration (BASE) Institute in Colorado Springs.

As Cornuke wrote: "Noah's ark should only be looked upon as a physical reminder of God's amazing faithfulness and power. The ark itself possesses no mystical power, but it represents a special act of God, a hinge in history that exemplifies the heart of God's amazing grace."

WALK TO BEAUTIFUL, subtitled The Power of Love and a Homeless Kid Who Found the Way, is the true story of country music star Jimmy Wayne, who, at the tender age of thirteen was left at a bus station parking lot by his bipolar mother. This story recounts Jimmy's horrendous childhood, marked by abuse and abandonment, his homeless years and finally, a time of stability and love offered him by the warmhearted couple, Russell and Bea Costner. Jimmy knew the foster care system firsthand and was well aware of its problems and its limits. His outcome, unlike many, was positive. Surviving incredibly tough times, he rose above the blackest moments and strove to do some good. He found his voice as an advocate for teens aging out of the foster care system and started the Meet Me Halfway Campaign. In 2010 he walked halfway across America to raise awareness for foster children. What an inspirational story---this is a book that can be well used in the teen

classroom. Jimmy's deep faith and belief in God enabled him to forgive those malignant figures of his past and spurred him to make good out of bad. He is also the author of the novel *Paper Angels*, based on the Salvation Army's Angel Tree Program.

Are you dating your church? Joshua Harris, author of STOP DATING THE CHURCH asks that very question of us. It is evident today that the younger generations do not want to commit to much of anything---marriage, church, or leadership roles in various organizations. There is an actual fear of commitment, so they dabble in church and dabble in relationships that don't include marriage. Church daters stay on the fringe, unwilling to make the plunge into total involvement. Harris maintains, "One cannot be a church member halfway. Once a member, true commitment must follow. The church community is where we learn to love God and others; where we are strengthened and transformed by truth from the Word, where we're taught to pray, to worship, and to serve, where we can be most certain that we're investing our time and abilities for eternity..." Gathering to worship with other believers in a local church is irreplaceable. When a church is together to worship and to hear God's Word preached, nourishment and encouragement occur that can't quite happen quite the same anywhere else." Our corporate worship edifies, and strengthens and glorifies God in ways nothing else can."

The author warns, "Do not take Sunday for granted. Do whatever it takes to rediscover the wonder of it all. Next Sunday, during the morning service, look around and remind yourself: 'These are my blood-bought brothers and sisters in Christ. We are His church, His people. We are here this morning to proclaim His work in our lives. We are here to give witness to the world of His great love and power and glory. ---What matters is that we will be together, with Him, on His day."

Meant to be a helpful message in this time of the closing down of many churches, the book **AUTOPSY OF A DECEASED CHURCH** by Thom S. Rainer describes the symptoms of ailing churches. He surmises there are some 150,000 U.S. churches that show signs of illness. These include a decline in membership, apathy, rarity of new members, church not a real presence in the community, reduced mission spending, obsession over facilities, and the "good old days' are 20 years in the past. In short, but powerful chapters the author illustrates how churches die---living in the past, growing inward, and most important of all, not reaching out into the

community. Dying churches are all about self-preservation. They are all about self. After demonstrating these sad but salient facts, Ralner goes on to present ways to keep your church alive! Rainer advocates steps to take to save the church. These include: a willingness to change radically and a willingness to take on an outward focus. This is a serious subject, but, oh, how relevant! Is yours one of these dying churches? This short but spot-on book is a MUST read! Save your church!

MOSES WAS A BASKET CASE by J.J Jasper. Just the title brings a smile to one's face! This is solid Christian humor at its best! I read "First Flight" from this book when I preached a sermon on Holy Humor Sunday. Its humor is infectious! The author had never been in a small plane. His instructor for the day assumed he had had 30 hours of flying lessons. "Okay, start it up," he ordered. "Start it up? I guess if you're going to get a license in only 40 hours, it has to be an accelerated program. It doesn't seem quite right." --- "My thoughts were interrupted by the instructor's command to taxi to the runway. "Taxi, what is taxi? Taxi to the runway and do what?" Read this chapter to find out what happens on this "First Flight!" Jasper is a well-known Christian comedian who also serves as the morning on-air personality for American Family Radio. He was born into a Southern Baptist family and made his commitment to Christ when he was about 12. These humorous and true stories that amuse and inspire represent many unique, out of the ordinary experiences that he has had. Titles range from "Chifforobe", "The Dump Truck", "Mistletoe", to the "Shack." Highly entertaining!

52 BIBLE CHARACTERS DRAMATIZED by Kenneth Osbeck. If your church is in need of a book that offers descriptions of Biblical figures, choose Osbeck's book that contains easy-to-use monologues for all occasions. These short dramas, featuring Eve, Noah, Miriam, and Joshua, the Apostles, Paul, Titus and Jude among others, are useful as additions to Scripture readings. These can be read as illustrations or can be acted out in full costume. They will definitely add interest and zest to church services. Osbeck is the author of *101 Hymn Stories*, *Amazing Grace: 366 inspiring Hymn Stories for Daily Devotions*, and other books.

It was an honor to step into the position of Moderator of the West Jersey Presbyterian Coordinating Team this past April. I have very large shoes to fill as Susan Bicker did a wonderful job in the position. I am looking forward to leading a wonderful, committed, mission minded coordinating team. One of the things I value about being Presbyterian is that it is a connectional denomination. My involvement on the Churchwide Coordinating Team (CCT) has made that more apparent to me. For the CCT, I am on the Creative Ministries Offering Committee. At the March '15 meeting, we chose the Thank Offering recipients. We read each application and every member is assigned her share to read closely. To my surprise the writer of one of "my" applications was someone I knew, Rev. Cheryl Thorne. She had been a Christian Education Director at my church in the early 90's. Cheryl later went to Seminary and is now a pastor at Westminster Presbyterian Church in Washington, Indiana. To get a good understanding of the various projects, I had telephone conversations with all the proposal writers within the USA and email conversations with those outside of the USA. Because Cheryl's' project was one of "mine", I had chance to talk to her and catch up. At the Churchwide Gathering I was walking through the exhibit area and Cheryl was manning one of the booths. I had another chance to catch up. I am happy to report that Cheryl's' project Helping Hands Ministry is receiving a Thank Offering Grant. Helping Hands Ministry collects gently used clothing and household items to make available to those in need. Many are immigrants from Haiti who have come to that area to work at the Purdue Chicken factory. The grant will be used to create a distribution site in the church, plus a place for the people to gather and socialize. Two trailers will also be purchased to take needed item directly to the people.

PWSNE is well represented at the Churchwide level. Virginia Champlin, from Geneva, NY, and the Presbytery of Geneva is the outgoing CCT Search Committee Moderator. She delivered the slate at the Business Meeting. Wykita Sterling as the Secretary/Historian. Wykita is the corresponding secretary for her PW in the Presbytery of Newark. She is from Plainfield, New Jersey. Rita Hooper, our PWSNE Together in Service Coordinator is from Fulton, N.Y. and the Presbytery of Cayuga-Syracuse. She was installed as the Search Committee member responsible for the Northeast/Boriquen Region (Puerto Rico).
