We have two primary role models of communication at our disposal...the Martin Luther/John Calvin model (circa 1500) who posted notes on the church door or the Bill Gates model (circa 2000) of cyber posting. PWS Leadership Coordinator Update Report

Since I last communicated with most of you, Churchwide Coordinating Team (CCT) has scheduled a training session for six representatives from each Synod in Albuquerque, NM from March 12 - 15, 2007. We will be bringing back, I am sure, a lot of answers to many of the questions we all have. In the meantime, here's a couple of items you can start reviewing now on both the local congregation level and the Presbytery, CT level.

* Examine your Bylaws with thoughts to the changes underway.

Start thinking about any position changes you think you will make (adding or deleting) and coordinating the changes with your bylaws. Keep in mind that although the name will change, if your PWPEC program was successful, keep the position. They should serve out their term and guide the transition to a merged or new position with/to Leadership Development. This transition should be completed by 2009. It might be well at this early stage in the transition to appoint one person to oversee this initially and bring up

items that need addressing as more information becomes available or have someone be the information person for this process.

- * Search/Nominating Committees should begin to look at position descriptions. In particular, the Leadership Coordinator position description should include training for all leaders when the changeover occurs.
- * Two models of communications

Undocumented. Not Criminal

Do you know what the Presbyterian Church (USA) has to say about immigration? We can read resolutions passed by the 217th (2006) and 216th (2004) General Assemblies, and those are helpful. But I wish each of you could have been present to hear Julia Thorne, an immigration lawyer who works at the Office of the General Assembly, when she addressed the Churchwide Coordinating Team of Presbyterian Women (CCT/PW) last September. I learned that our immigration laws are often harsh, cruel and frequently separate families for years. Because of this, we are called upon (as Christians) to work to change punitive measures. We should let our legislators know that we want our immigration laws to be reasonable, compassionate and fair. Many people believe a great deal of erroneous information about immigration. For example, many people think that an undocumented person is a criminal. How often have you heard, "But they broke the law!" In fact, an undocumented person has violated civil law, but not criminal law. Undocumented people may have either entered the United States without a visa, or they may overstay their visas

There are estimated to be twenty million undocumented people in the United States. Many of these have overstayed their visas. There are undocumented pastors in PC(USA) churches. A lot of the overstays are Africans. If a person ever overstays a visa, that person will never be allowed into the United States again. Julia told us about a

woman from Mali who had overstayed her visa. Her father was dying, but if she had gone home to visit him, she wouldn't have been allowed back into the US. Many people get non-immigrant visas, but overstay those visas. To get a non-immigrant visa, a person must be entering the US for a specific purpose. The person must not intend to immigrate to the US. The visa will have a letter indicating the purpose of the visit. For example, "F" indicates a student visa. Several "H" categories are for migrant and temporary workers. If a person is of low income, that person may be denied a visa out of the fear that the person intends to overstay.

An asylee is a person who makes it to the border of the US and then asks for asylum. Asylees are likely to be thrown into detention centers. We need to be concerned about conditions in these detention centers, and that those detained have access to due process.

If a US citizen marries an undocumented person, the undocumented person is supposed to go back to their own country, and probably will not be allowed to come back to the US for ten years.

The 217th GA said this: "(We will)...not sway from our solidarity with, and pledge to service to, all brothers and sisters regardless of their race, creed, color, nationality or residency status."

One of my favorite activities while attending the 2006 Women's Gathering was visiting the booths in the Great Room. Many booths caught my eye but one in particular was the one titled "Faces of Children". "Faces of Children" began at First Presbyterian Church, Midland Texas as an ecumenical prayer ministry interceding for children at risk. This prayer ministry has grown to include Churches and individuals across the country and maybe the world. Their goal is to make sure suffering children are not forgotten.

Some of the statistics they publish are mind boggling. 300,000 child soldiers, one billion poor children, 2,000,000 victims of commercial sex, 15 million AIDS orphans, 246 million child laborers and 130 million - deprived of education - many of them girls - just because they are girls.

How does this prayer ministry work? About once or twice a month a list of children with their stories are E-mailed to you and you are asked to pray for them. Individuals can do it or you can post it for Justice and Peace continued...

- · Pray that enough schools will be constructed in order that all Dalit children may receive an education. Please pray that the organizations and individuals working to build 1000 schools for Dalit children will be successful in their efforts.
- · Please pray that many people would be moved to sponsor 4000 Dalit children in the coming year, providing them with a bilingual education, uniforms, midday meals and textbooks.

United States

Give thanks to God that 6-year-old Tiera's brain surgery earlier this month went well and that she was released from the hospital. Please continue to pray for God's healing mercies as she continues her recovery at home

Please be in prayer for teenaged girls in this country who are involved in violent fights and a rising level of conflicts with other girls. Girl-on-girl aggression is increasing in the United States as a third wave of an epidemic of violence. (The first wave was urban poor America; the second wave was suburban small-town rural America; the third wave seems to be girls and violence. Red Orbit News) Pray for an increase in conflict-resolution programs. Pray that a wave of kindness will wash over these young women instead of waves of violence and aggression.
