I have met a lot of women, gone a lot of places and made new friends. Every Gathering was the same, but different. Each place and format was unique, but there was an unmistakable Presbyterian Women's feel

to it.

I am happy to announce that Reverend Terri Cisse, the interim pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Levittown, in Levittown, N Y. is now the Chair Person for the Racial Ethnic Dialogs Design Team. Terri has also volunteered to be the Moderator for PW in the Presbytery of Long Island. We are very fortunate to have Terri's leadership skills in PWSNE.

Our relationship with the Brazilian Immigrant Center continues to deepen. After consulting with the Facilitating Committee, of the PWSNE Coordinating Team, I have signed a letter of support for the Domestic Worker's Bill of Rights, proposed by the Bridgeport, Connecticut Brazilian Immigrant Center, Inc. The proposal will be sent to Connecticut State Assembly.

One big concern I have is that we don't have Moderator elect, at this point. The Search Committee has been working at contacting people. I know very well how scary the prospect of being Moderator is. It took me a long time to agree. I had never been a PW In the Presbytery Moderator and I considered that a big disadvantage. I was pleasantly surprised how much people offered to help me.

I deeply appreciate the opportunity to be your Moderator. Thank you.

There are several options you can take advantage of including a trip to DC to be a part of Ecumenical Advocacy Days which begins Friday March 21.

Nearly 3,000 children in the U.S. killed by guns each year;

A quarter of U.S. women experiencing domestic abuse at some point in their lives;

A decade of war, nearly 1,000 civilians killed by drones, and Pentagon spending dominating our federal budget over poverty protections, healthy job creation, economic revitalization and true international human security;

More than 45 million refugees worldwide uprooted from their homes by persecution and armed conflict; and Deadly conflicts over natural resources erupting around the world.

Peace in the Community- So that all may live free from fear (Micah 4:4)

Peace with the Earth - So that life is sustained

Peace in the Marketplace- So that all may live with dignity

Peace among the Peoples – So that human lives are protected*

Through prayer, worship, speakers, workshops and advocacy training we will discover a faith-based vision for national policies that will "guide our feet into the path of peace" (*Luke 1:79*). Book Review

"Celebratepeace"

The other day I was in a local church lobby and picked up a little book that I needed to read at just that right moment. Celebratepeace, by Louise Diamond, the founder of The Peace Company. The book contains 108 ways to create a more peaceful world. It's a book you can refer to from time to time and be lifted up!

Taken from the book:

"Inner peace is about connection with our true and natural self and a sense of being part of something larger – giving rise to serenity, balance, and a feeling of well-being." "Peace with others is about our connection with the open heart, sharing our humanness." "Peace in our communities and in the world requires a connection to respect for our multiple differences and the right of all people to justice, freedom and dignity."

"Peace is a state of mind and a path of action. It is a concept, a goal, an experience, an ideal. It is personal and political, local and global. Above all, peace is a way of living."

The 108 examples represent some very pithy, helpful, timely words for us to live by. One that struck me is the following:

#59:Forgive. "Forgiveness is something that happens first in your own heart. You cannot force it. When you're ready and willing to let go of your anger and desire for blame and revenge, then you can release yourself from that burden."

I'm sure all of us have had a small itch in our lives that continues to bind us from living more freely because we've been wronged in some way whether that's reality or a figment of our imagination. The notion of forgiveness is far from our thinking.

"But, give it to God, to the earth, to the wind or water; give it up or put it down, using whatever language works for you. Breathe deeply. Feel the new space opening in your heart".

I recommend Celebratepeace for your reading and spiritual consumption!

Magadalene Lewis Chosen for the 2014 Global Exchange

Magdalene Lewis has been selected to represent PW in the Synod of the Northeast in the Presbyterian Women's Global Exchange trip to the Caribbean in November 2014. Magdalene is from the New York City Presbytery.

Every three years, a group from Presbyterian Women travels to another part of the world to hear about the joys, concerns and ministries of other women, plus share faith stories. The following year, women from the same part of the world are invited to itinerate in synods and participate in the Churchwide Gathering of Presbyterian Women.

Future issues of *Horizons* magazine and the Presbyterian Women website www.pcusa.org/pw will have resources about the concerns the group will study and information on the organizations they will visit.

Magdalene will prepare for the trip, be taking 14 days out of her life to travel in the Caribbean in November 2014, speak throughout the Synod of the Northeast for 2 years following the experience, and participate in the 2015 Churchwide Gathering.

Your financial assistance is needed to cover the following costs:

- \$3,500.00 for the trip itself
- travel expenses for speaking engagements beyond what the inviting PW can provide
- hosting someone from the Caribbean during the 2 weeks prior to the 2015 Churchwide Gathering
- a round trip ticket for the visitor's transportation to and from the hosting Synod and the Churchwide Gathering
- provide financial assistance for Magdalene to attend the 2015 Churchwide Gathering, where she will have a role in interpreting the Global Exchange

PWSNE has created an account to collect donations for the program. Money can be sent from individuals, a PW in a congregation or a PW in the Presbytery. Send all donations to the PWSNE treasurer, Gloria Hanewald at 181 Sparrow Drive, Hamilton, NJ08690, by September 30, 2014, using the accompanying remittance form.

Magdalene's participation in the Global Exchange trip will enrich all of us and inspire future PW mission projects. Please schedule a presentation in the two years following her return. Try to cover her travel expenses when she visits your PW group and offer her an honorarium, which she will contribute to the PWSNE Global Exchange Fund. SISTERS STAND AND WALK TOGETHER

Sisters Stand and Walk Together (SSWT) is a program of Presbyterian Women in the Synod of the Northeast, designed to familiarize women who have immigrated from other countries to the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and to Presbyterian Women. Women from many areas of the world have graduated from the program. Some have become leaders in Presbyterian Women in the Synod of the Northeast.

This program was formerly held at Stony Point Conference Center and included lectures, forums and workshops. A new approach is now being implemented. One is the original designers of the program, Anne Reynolds will visit groups to customize the *Sisters Stand and Walk Together* curriculum to a given group, congregation or presbytery. The curriculum is being revised so that it can be given out to interested groups.

The curriculum includes:

- History of the Racial Ethnic Dialogue in Presbyterian Women in the Synod of the Northeast
- Exposure to the Presbyterian Women's purpose, and structure
- How to develop and lead a Bible study using the Horizons Bible study as a resource
- How to plan a workshop
- · How to conduct an ice breaker
- Cultural barrier issues
- Women's role in the church
- · How to plan a worship service
- Introduction to resources (Book of Order, Book of Common Worship, Hymnals, periodicals, websites, etc.)

First of all for those of you who missed our mission coworkers, Reverends Nancy and Shelvis Smith-Mather's interview on CNN here is the link to view it http://mmediacenter.tveyes.com/downloadgateway.aspx? UserID=186895&MDID=2758539&MDSeed=3177&Type= Media

Secondly, I had opportunity to speak with PCOSS Moderator Rev. Peter Gai and General Secretary Rev. John Yor both yesterday and today, we can be so proud of our PCOSS leaders and their strong witness to the Gospel in what has been a horrific situation. Rev. Peter Gai talked about fulfilling his duty to protect the 2,000 Dinka, Nuer, Shilluk, Anuak and Murle individuals who have found refuge on the PCOSS compound by posting guard at the gate. He also shard that 4,000 individuals were being refuged at the Bam center (the site of the Women's Dept., Nile Theological College and Giffen Institute of Theology.) PCOSS's commitment to providing shelter without regard to ethnicity in a town where a political conflict took on ethnic dimensions was a very brave position to take. These are testimonies to the power of the Gospel of reconciliation and reminds me of similar stories we heard out of Rwanda a couple of decades ago.

The good news is that both yesterday and today the moderator and general Secretary both reported that Malakal and Doleib Hill are both calm, that the fighting has stopped. They are continuing to hear some gunfire outside of the city. Please continue to pray for all to honor the ceasefire and for God to comfort this deeply traumatized population. In Christ.

An Evening Honoring Martin Luther King, Jr.

When Martin Luther King stood on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial in 1963 to deliver his famous, "I Have a Dream" speech, he envisioned all races and religions coming together and living in peace. Those words, so eloquently spoken, made us think and inspired us to be better people and slowly, over time, change did happen.

Reverend Terry Yvette Cissé, the interim Pastor at the First Presbyterian Church of Levittown, had a similar dream of bringing different religions and races to her church, and on Sunday her dream came true. Reverends from around Long Island, along with a Cantor, joined together in a musical celebration. "I am excited to bring this event to Levittown," Rev. Cissé said. "It's a wonderful opportunity to bring this community together and celebrate the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King and Nelson Mandela."

Looking stunning in a gold robe and turban from Timbuktu, where she once lived, Rev. Cissé opened the services with a greeting to the members of the church, many who had come not just locally but from out of state, some from her previous parish in New Jersey. Reverend Mark Tammen, The General Presbyter of Long Island, opened with a prayer and then Universal Praise filled the church with song as part of a musical presentation. After the sign of peace the PAYLA psalmists wowed the audience with more musical renditions, getting the entire church to join in.

The PAYLA project — short for the Pan African Youth Leadership Academy — was created to engage youth in New York and Long Island metropolitan areas from racial ethnic and at risk communities with leadership potential to take an active role in bringing about change in their communities. This project is endorsed by the presbyteries of New York City and Long Island. The funds collected during the service will go toward a camp they are sending students to this summer who will be part of the PAYLA project.

After readings from a Hebrew and Greek bible, Cantor Steve Sher of Temple B'nai Torah of Wantagh sang for the congregation. Liturgical dancers from Christ First Presbyterian of Hempstead, First Presbyterian Church Freeport and the Presbyterian Church of Sweet Hollow, Melville danced throughout the church and engaged the audience members.

Elder Jermaine Ofori Bethel with the House of Yahweh in the Bronx spoke of the life of Martin Luther King. He talked of the legacy that MLK left behind by planting the seeds of hope. Levittown started as a potato farm until WWII ended and the returning GI's needed affordable housing. William Levitt, a Jewish builder, created Levittown with the stipulation that the homes only be sold to white Christians, no Jews, no blacks. Fast forward to 2014 and here was a multiracial, religious congregation celebrating Martin Luther King's life, led by their Rev. Cissé a Princeton, Harvard educated woman and the first African American woman to lead the parish.

Rev. Cissé admits that it has not always been easy but she is very optimistic and hopeful about the community and has many more programs to bring different cultures together. The evening ended with more musical renditions, one from a diminutive Kyetah Bryant with a powerful voice that got everyone up on their feet, clapping and singing. The energy and joy in the church were palpable. As the music ended, the words of Martin Luther King echoed in the church as guests filed out hugging one another. Wiping tears from her eyes Rev. Wanda Hughes, Pastor, Presbyterian Church of Garden City had this comment," I thought it was a joyful celebration. It was inspired and wonderful for all of us to get together and celebrate. I was deeply touched and moved."

PW Women in the News

Maggie Lewis, our PWSNE Rep. to PW CCT has send out the *Quarterly New for PW Leaders*. On page 3 is an article written by **Emily Castine**, the PWP Moderator for PW in the Presbytery of Northern NY. It describes how they celebrated the 25th Anniversary of PW and how they hosted and shared ideas with 32 women from Canada at their Fall Gathering.

On page 41 of the Jan./Feb. edition of *Horizon's*, **Lori Evans**, the PWP Moderator in the Presbytery of Monmouth is mentioned regarding her efforts to bring awareness of *Orange Days*, which is part of the UN's campaign to end violence against women. On the 25 th of each month people are asked to wear orange to raise awareness about violence against women. Lori's efforts culminated in her arranging to "paint her town orange". deal of change. Change is not new, but there are distinctive contours to the change we experience today. Technological advance, easy access to information and cross-border trade, encounters with peoples representing a variety of perspectives and cultures—all are aspects of our daily lives. We can't avoid seeing the divisions forged between nature and neighbor and between nature and neighbor and neighbor along lines of race, class, gender, and nation. These divisions impact representation in decision-making bodies, support exploitation of the earth, exacerbate the unequal distribution of wealth, and limit access for many to the natural resources we all need to survive and flourish.

Paul's writings are some of the most influential in Christianity. Therefore, revisiting the struggles Paul faced and the authenticity and integrity of his theology is an essential task for churches today. Paul, like us, wrestled with and questioned his faith as he tried to live as authentically as possible in an ancient world that was also in the midst of a great deal of change. What can we learn from revisiting 2 Corinthians and considering Paul's theology and ideas as they relate to the context of our fine.

This study invites us all to ask whether or not we understood Paul's writings clearly in the past and to read his letter afresh in light of the issues we face in our time. Concepts of shared parthership, power in weakness, healing, reconciliation, love, and a new apostolate all figure prominently in Elizabeth's reading of Paul. She hopes that you will find your own voices among the larger community of interpreters as we discern together the meaning of these ancient passages for the world in which we live today.
