# Coordinating Team charts course for triennium

The Churchwide Coordinating Team of Presbyterian Women (CCT) met September 6-9, 2012, in Louisville, Kentucky, to embark on the business of the triennium. Just prior to the CCT meeting, the Churchwide Search Committee, 2012 Gathering Planning Team and Communications Committee met. Highlights are part of this report.

# Churchwide Gathering wrap-up

The leadership of the 2012 Churchwide Gathering met for a wrap-up meeting in Louisville, to evaluate the event and make recommendations for the 2015 Gathering (June 8-22).

# Gathering by the numbers

Attendance was 1,887, plus exhibitors. Full registration was \$480; 1,668 qualified for early registration at \$440. There were 185 scholarships, 187 waived registrations for CCT, GPT, workshop leaders, and helpers. There were 83 women in the 20s-30s age group and 21 attendees under 17 years of age. Another 200 opted for one-day, five meals/plenary and weekend registrations. Fifty-two percent registered online. Horizons benefitted from a special Gathering renewal and subscription rate—380 new subscriptions.

### **Evaluations**

Participants particularly noted satisfaction with plenary topics, diversity, international guests, mission emphasis, talking with individuals, living out the Gathering theme, gift cards for Immokalee, action opportunities and learning new skills to take home. # CCT fall 2012 meeting, continued from front page

The committee presented the PW in the PC(USA) Gift Acceptance Policy for review and approval. This policy will provide gift acceptance criteria for donors and will be useful to the Funds Development Committee during review of nontraditional gifts (assets). The policy can also guide the committee when there might be a conflict between the gift and the mission and purpose of PW and PC(USA).

Justice and Peace Concerns—Sheila Louder, chair
The Justice and Peace Concerns Committee has discerned three main focus areas for the new triennium: human trafficking, Native American women, and issues involving children. Immediate work will begin with planning the Together in Action Day on human trafficking, reaching out to Native women's communities and engaging Bread for the World's 1,000 Days campaign for maternal and child health.

Scholarship selections are being made for the 57th UN Commission on the Status of Women, March 1–15, 2013, in New York. PW also will offer 10 scholarships of \$180 each to women who will attend Ecumenical Advocacy Days (EAD) April 5–8 in Washington, D.C. Email meagan.manas@pcusa.org to apply. The CCT approved a partnership with the group Heeding God's Call (www.heedinggodscall.org) and recommends the following resources to any circle or congregation interested in taking action to end gun violence: "Gun Violence, Gospel Values: Mobilizing in Response to God's Call," online at www.pcusa.org/resource/gun-violence gospel-values-mobilizing-response-god; and The Gun Violence Prevention Toolkit online at www.pcusa.org/resource/gun-violenceprevention-congregational-toolkit.

The CCT will send letters to PC(USA) moderator Neal Presa, vice moderator Tom Trinidad, and stated clerk Gradye Parsons to address concerns from the General Assembly, including divestment discussion management and the bullying of Tara McCabe, who resigned as PC(USA) vice moderator. PW is calling for individual Presbyterian women to divest any personal holdings in Caterpillar until Caterpillar's machinery is no longer sold to be used as implements of violence and destruction.

Leadership Enhancement—Susan Skoglund, chair LEC continues to evaluate the roll-out of the Takin' It to the Congregations training provided in September 2010. A task group has been formed to plan one or more Webinar sessions to reengage, reeducate and inspire the trainers. LEC also has formed a task group to develop a process to expand the Sisters Stand and Walk Together program to additional synods as approved at the 2012 PW Business Meeting.

The CCT will participate in adaptive leadership training at its March 2013 meeting. And LEC has initiated a partnership with Presbyterian Mission Agency staff who have expertise in working with young adults. LEC will begin to explore PW-focused young adult initiatives (for example, intergenerational dialogue). See page 6 for more on LEC initiatives.

Mission Relationships—Pam Snyder, chair
The Mission Relationships Committee selected the
Caribbean region for the 2014 Global Exchange. MRC will
work with the Caribbean North America Council for Mission,
which aims to build partnership and increase mission formation and education among Caribbean nations.

The Roma Development project is facing a turning point in its life that we hope will lead to a more independent organization with local leadership. To help facilitate and encourage this transition, we will sponsor a consultation between representatives of PW and regional partners.

The 2010 USAME visited The Sweetgrass Project on Pine Ridge Reservation. The project seeks to prevent suicide among teens and young adults of the Oglala Sioux Tribe. PW will continue to support this project through inclusion in its 2012–2015 Mission Matters program.

Creative Ministries—Doreen Der-McLeod, chair CMOC met on August 23–25 in Louisville to review 34 submitted proposals for the 2013 Birthday Offering of PW. Just one recipient was selected to receive a grant from the 2013 offering. **Search Committee**—Virginia Champlin, chair The Search Committee met September 3–5 in Louisville. They reviewed and revised forms, developed a communication plan, discussed assigned regions and made additional assignments, to include racial ethnic women's caucuses and groups, and young women's networks. PW Together in Action Day was initiated by the Mission Relationships and Justice and Peace committees of the CCT. The idea behind PW's Together in Action Day is that once a year Presbyterian women around the country will join together to take action on an issue that is important to PW. One of the issues where we feel lots of energy and an urgent desire for change is human trafficking, so it was chosen by PW as the focus for its first annual action day.

January 11 falls on a Friday, but feel free to hold events through the weekend and honor this day in worship on Sunday, January 13! # Recipient offers services to children, families in Indiana

In his letter to the faithful in Rome, the Apostle Paul reminds James that "Each of us should please our neighbor for their good in order to build them up" so that "together, with one voice we can glorify the God and father of our Lord Jesus Christ" (Rom. 15:2, 6).

When the Creative Ministries Offering Committee met in August, it faced a difficult task. The committee received 34 applications for grants to fund projects that ranged from providing clean water to expanding schools and nursing homes. Because of a drop in donations to the 2012 Birthday Offering, we may not be able to fully fund the three

projects approved for that year. CMOC made the painful decision to approve funds for only one of the many projects that submitted applications, hoping to raise at least \$200,000 for the recipient.

The Westminster Neighborhood Ministries Child, Family and Adult Educational Connection was selected for funding in 2013. This ministry is located in Indianapolis, Indiana. Westminster is dedicated to reaching out to low-income families and their children. Westminster will use the grant to expand its educational services, extending service to preschool-age

children, expanding its basic adult education program, and providing financial counseling to families so that they can more effectively improve and sustain their standard of living. Vocational training and participating in community gardens are integral parts of the program, with a focus on developing

> job skills, understanding how to effectively apply for employment, and exploring nutritious food options where grocery stores are not available in the inner city.

While funds continue to arrive to honor the three 2012 Birthday Offering projects, we continue to need broad, consistent support from our Presbyterian women in order to continue funding mission projects like the one

selected for 2013. We hope you will continue to promote the Birthday Offering in your presbyteries and congregations so that our 2013 and future award recipients will receive their entire award.

Presbyterian Women strives to become an inclusive and carina community, but in order to become one, we need to know where we are. Who is currently committed and interested in taking a hard look at how well we are doing as a community? Who and what is motivating your PW group to take on racial justice work? What is your PW group's relationship with racial ethnic women in the church and community?

As was reported in the last quarterly newsletter, voting delegates to the 2012 Churchwide Business Meeting took

action, urging PW groups in presbyteries and synods to read and study the report of the Structural Review Task Group approved by voting delegates at the 2003 Churchwide Business Meeting and to make intentional efforts to implement the recommendations included in the report. Some of these recommendations:

• that PW, as an organization, commit itself at all levels to electing and appointing more racial ethnic

- women in leadership, using specific means to achieve that goal; and
- that PW use multiple approaches, such as antiracism training and cultural proficiency training as part of required PW leadership training in order to promote inclusion of all women in PW and the PC(USA).

PW's Antiracism Committee strongly encourages everyone to study this report and walk with the Antiracism Committee on this journey to an inclusive and caring community. We need companions!

# Presbyterian Women's leaders adapt, commit to intergenerational dialogue

Leadership committee promoting adaptive leadership

PW's Leadership Enhancement Committee (LEC) is promoting the use of adaptive leadership with buttons available from PW's marketing office (carissa.herold@pcusa.org). The buttons are free as long as finances permit. Limit 25.

Adaptive leadership seeks to solve challenges that defy traditional problem-solving. For example, we have been trying for years to bring more women into PW. We have tried changing our meeting times and days; we have varied our programs—all technical changes. We continue to lose members. So we need to learn adaptive leadership and change. Adaptive change requires experimentation, acquiring new knowledge and changing attitudes, values and behaviors. An example is PW's hiring of a funds development expert and joining the Women's Funding Network.

In July 2011, LEC sent two of its members to adaptive leadership training at Montreat Conference Center. LEC recommended and the CCT concurred that CCT have a training session as early as possible during the next triennium (scheduled for March 2013).

Adaptive change is not easy; it requires developing and using a different mindset than we might have used in the past. When we employ adaptive techniques, we often must turn up the pressure on an organization and allow conflict to exist rather than rush to keep everyone comfortable. It requires us to look at the big picture. Ron Heifitz, a noted expert on adaptive leadership, says it is like looking at a dance floor from above so that you see the whole floor, not just part.

All levels of the organization must be involved and committed to the change for it to be effective. How might you and your PW group use adaptive leadership to thrive and grow?

# PW commits to intergenerational dialogue

Where are the young women? This question has concerned PW groups for quite some time. At the Churchwide level, PW has done several things to engage this issue over time. One was through inclusion of young women on the CCT. For some time, the CCT had four positions filled by young

women representing the National Network of Presbyterian College Women (NNPCW) and Racial Ethnic Young Women Together (REYWT). At the 2012 Business Meeting, two

additional young women representative at-large positions were added.

During the 2006–2009 triennium, PW also created the Young Women's Task Force. LEC worked closely with this task force and, through this process, has grown deeper in its appreciation of young women's

perceptions, perspectives and needs. The idea of intergenerational dialogue emerged from this process.

On September 8, LEC met with Presbyterian Mission Agency staff who are engaged in young adult ministry. We learned a great deal about the ways in which the church is currently engaged in ministries with young people. We also learned:

- 1. If we want to engage young people, we need to first hear them; in order for us to hear them, young people need to have a safe space where they can speak their truth.
- 2. The traditional faith journey has been believe-join-serve, but young people typically follow the pattern of servejoin-believe. They are passionate about mission and doing justice, and their engagement in service often leads them to a faith community.
- 3. The age group most hungry for programs is that of those who are post-college.

We talked about how to take intergenerational dialogue forward. We learned that as many as eight young women will be attending the UN Commission on the Status of Women. LEC has concluded that this would offer optimal space and opportunity to begin a dialogue. Four members of LEC will be participating in CSW in March 2012. We are hoping that this gathering at CSW, with a common purpose of addressing the issue of violence against women, will help women of different generations find points of connection and that this conversation will help us build trust across generations, find ways to support and strengthen one another, and carry out God's mission together.

You will learn how this distribution center processes the items that you send for mothers and babies in Africa; you will assemble Safe Motherhood Kits and sort other items to be shipped to other parts of the world. She is serving as the chaplain intern there and says justice issues abound on the backside, especially for the women. "I chose The Face Is Familiar because I believe it conveys a powerful message about the women who go unnamed in Scripture. Working on the backside can often be a thankless job," and the women who work the backside go unseen. "I believe exploring what it means to carry a name may be an important message for these too-often-forgotten women." In September, Presbyterian Women mission and offering staff received good news from a Thank Offering recipient in Madagascar. Jan Heckler, PC(USA) mission coworker in Madagascar, reported that Akany Gazela, a boarding home built for young women of high school age so they can attend secondary school, was dedicated in July. The home was built by Dorkasy, the women's division of the PC(USA)'s partner church in Madagascar, FJKM, with the help of a grant from the 2011 Thank Offering.
