On behalf of the Design Team, I hope everyone had a good time at the Gathering. I and the rest of the Design Team – Virginia Champlin, Sue Liu, Jane Kim and Gail Banks felt relieved that everything went very well. We want to thank you:

The attendees, speakers, music leaders, workshop leaders, panelists, worship leaders and most of all many cheer leaders who supported the Design Team before and throughout the Gathering.

A long journey. It started with my accepting the chair position of the Design Team for this Triennial Gathering in October 2014. Then, what will the theme be? Whom should I invite to join the Design Team? Whom will we invite to speak and lead the workshop and worship? Where do we hold the Gathering with reasonable travel distance and with affordable fees? We made a big decision – to plan a "2-day 1-night" gathering as compared to "3-day 2-night" in previous gatherings. We learned

to set a budget, worked around the format of the Gathering and signed up the Gathering speakers. The Design Team did many conference calls for brain storming and task assignments. Many details were finally set in the month of July. Big thanks to the immediate past Moderator Maxine Hunter who did six email blasts in July/August - one per week for 6 weeks straight. Those email blasts boosted the registration from both commuters and those who stayed overnight. What did I learn from these powerful email blasts? Does the water going down the drain go clock wise or counter clockwise (because we will be on the other side of the equator)? These are the questions that my granddaughters have been asking me about my upcoming trip to Indonesia for the Global Exchange.

Yes, I do have my own questions. I am full of excitement and wonder that I have been the chosen one to represent the Presbyterian Women of the Northeast. I am just awed that I am following in the footsteps of such a legacy of women that have gone on previous Global Exchanges: Maggie Lewis = Caribbean; Lucy Janjjgian & Jenny Lee = India; Jenny Lee & Ruth Aimee-Belonni-Rosario = Eastern Europe; Dotsie Shaw & Alpha Brown = Africa; Robert Mansfield = Brazil. All of these women came back with some wonderful memories and relationships. I just hope that I can live up to their reputations.

"Building Bridges of Understanding" ... so that we may be mutually encouraged by each other's faith both yours and mine (Romans 1:120 is the theme of this year's Global Exchange to Indonesia, September 12-29 Building bridges of understanding, as Sisters of Christ we will: learn how to live respectfully in a multi-faith culture and encourage and accompany one another as together we seek a more peaceful and just world. We will hear the joys and pain that our sisters there experience, and to share faith stories and ministries with one another.

Christianity is a minority religion in Indonesia. One of our events will be attending a panel discussion at a Christian Center with women that represent some of the religions: Muslim, Hinduism, Buddhism, and Confucianism. We will learn how all of these and many other religions co-exist.

We will be on the Island of Java visiting four different locations: Jakarta, Solo (Surakarta), Yagakarta and Bali. In Jakarta, we will be staying at a Church Guest House.

Bernie and Farsijana Adeney-Risakotta, PCUSA Mission Co-Workers deployed to Indonesia are eagerly awaiting our arrival and are anxious to share their work and ministry with us. We will be learning more about their aiding the local folk with their entrepreneurs and also about batik, a method of cloth dying.

Attending this year's Global Exchange will be 12 Synod Representatives, the Churchwide Moderator Carol Winkler, Churchwide Staff Kathy Reeves and Laura Lee. This will be Kathy's last Global Exchange as she will be retiring the following September. Laura Lee is the art director for the *Horizons* Bible Study, *Horizons* Magazine and all other PW publications.

I am so grateful for all the generous donations given to Synod Global Exchange account to make the next GX possible. Like I said in the beginning, the funds were there for me to attend, but the expectations were that we raise the money to replenish the account to afford the next person to attend. There have been so many individual personal donations, Presbytery PW donations, Geneva area restaurants & Billsboro Winery for hosting a fund raising evening. Each and every donation has been so appreciated. The Geneva PW Coordinating Team, churches, & Moderator Linda Werts have been so generous with their donations and time, as well.

I look forward to sharing with everyone my findings upon my return. I ask you all to keep our delegation in your prayers. Next year, some of the women from Indonesia will come to visit us to share their stories and attend the Churchwide Gathering in Louisville, August 2018.

Global Exchange Necklaces

WOW! Our Synod Women donated their love for the Women in Indonesia with the most beautiful hand knitted necklaces. Put together they were quite a beautiful rainbow. Thank You everyone for your generosity.

Instructions: The yarn is hard to find in retail

Look for ribbon yarns, track yarns, or flag yarns online. Try YarnParadise.com. Your crochet hook should be large; size J is best.

Pull out a length of yarn about 13 inches long and leave it unworked. On the same strand, next work a chain stitch for approximately 13 inches. About 42 stitches work for me, but it may take more or less, depending on the thickness of the yarn. Keep your work loose! Leave another 13 inches unworked. Cut. Pull the yarn through the last stitch and fasten off. Make as many of these chains as you want in your necklace. I usually put five to seven together to make a necklace. After you have completed the number of chains that you want, hold them together so they line up. Then tie a knot in all of them together about three inches from the end of the chain. Tie a similar knot three inches from the other end of the strands. Tie the two ends together in another knot. Pull this knot very tight so that it will not come undone when you pull the necklace over your head. You can determine the length of your necklace by where you tie this final knot; leaving approximately one inch outside the knot will work for most women's head sizes. If you have left more than one inch at the end, measure about one inch down and trim all yarn ends to that length. If you have a shorter end, trim ends to be even. If you wish to make the necklace adjustable, pull all strands through a bead with a darning needle or small crochet hook, before tying the final knot. The bead works as a slide so the necklace can be shortened.

Hudson River PWP India Mission

For the last year and a half, PWP of Hudson River has been involved with a small community in the far northeast of India, where the local pastor of the Zou Presbyterian Church has been attempting to build a facility along the lines of the Stony Point Center. We were able to fulfill Rev. Muanmangthang's original request for sewing machines, instructors and fabric to develop a women's sewing cooperative.

It was immediately apparent that this was only the beginning of what was needed. The village of Singngat is an impoverished farming community of the slash and burn variety, with no nearby source of water, or toilets.

Rev. Gary Myers is a retired PC(USA) pastor who has made several trips to the area, and who has seen and dedicated the sewing machines. Between the congregations in Hudson River and those with which Rev. Myers is involved, we have so far also been able to provide:

chickens and a coop for a Heifer style Project, a dozen beehives, for honey and cultivation of more bees.

a water pump, piping, and two water tanks near to the villagers' homes,

a supply of cleaner cookstoves to replace threestone open fires, horrible for health, deforestation, and air pollution.

Worth noting and applauding is the effort of Diana Behan's granddaughter Hannah, who raised an amazing amount to provide beehives!! Also noteworthy is Rev. Mangmuanthang's concern about climate change, and how it will affect the monsoons they experience.

I am thrilled to report that this project is the recipient of the Triennial offering of \$1620!!!

The first priority will be to build a latrine to be used by the women working at the sewing center! Many thanks to Su-Ling Lai and the Design team, and to all the women who contributed!

This very informal project has been rewarding, because once we send the funds, work in India be-

gins; there is no middle organization. Rev. Mangmuanthang is faithful about sending photos of the work as it progresses, and photos of the receipts for the building materials they use. It doesn't often work that way in India! You can see some of the results on the wonderful poster our moderator Diana assembled! (diana.pwhrp@gmail.com)

I invite any other PWPs to join us in this effort. In particular, assistance from some of the PWPs that have been working on women's hygiene issues would be appreciated! The women do have sewing machines, but I've been having trouble locating instructions that can be understood by women with little education. And more cookstoves are needed to supply the villagers. In the fall of 2016 Presbyterian Women though out PCUSA donated enough money to the Thank Offering Fund to offer grants totaling \$382,500. In late winter of 2017, the Creative Ministries Offering Committee of the PW Churchwide Coordinating Team reviewed ninety-two applications. Fifteen projects were chosen. South End Neighborhood Tutors, Inc. The Wizard's Wardrobe Albany, New York \$10.000

The Wizard's Wardrobe is a one-on-one afterschool-tutoring program for children in the first and second grades. This program seeks to stimulate students' enthusiasm for learning and increase their literacy levels by helping them write and produce their own storybooks. This Thank Offering grant will be used to purchase digital recorders, computers, printers, and bindery equipment with which to take the collection of ideas to the celebration of finished books. www.thewizardswardrobe.org

\$18,300

Hope Mission School exists to sustain itself economically and to ensure educational and vocational opportunities for the community's youth. This grant will contribute to the expansion of the school to a full high school by adding 11th and 12th grades, and will introduce new vocational training that will lead to new income streams. The grant will also be used to purchase generators and a small freezer. The school will produce income by selling cold drinks and excess power for recharging cell phones and other electronic devices.

I have heard from several groups in our synod that have been busy collecting school supplies for for distribution in their local areas as well as producing school kits to send through Church World Service. Some are also supporting the Backpack project through their local food pantries or directly with the schools to provide healthy food items for use on weekends by children who might otherwise go hungry when not getting meals at school. The gift of a food filled backpack or bag of school supplies not only provides essentials for children who might otherwise go without but shares God's love and lets the recipient know that others are thinking of them and are concerned for their health and welfare.

October is Domestic Violence month and many of our groups support their local shelters and transitional houses. It's not too late to plan a collection of useful items for the women and children staying in the safe houses or being transitioned to independent living.

With colder winter approaching those who knit and crochet are busy preparing their donations of warm hats, mittens, scarves, and blankets that are then distributed to local shelters and sent throughout the world. Knitting4peace is still requesting knit items so keep up the good work as there are many who don't have adequate protection from the cold.

Several groups had posters and information about their mission projects at the Synod Triennial this month. The Crayon initiative was highlighted. This is a project to collect crayons which are made of wax and is not biodegradable and recycles them into new crayons to be given to children in need (www.thecrayoninitiative.org). Park Presbyterian PW are still collecting money for solar lanterns for South Sudan to provide teachers and students with light so they are able to do school work at home after dusk. DIRECTOR OF SPIRITUAL LIFE AT BLOOM-FIELD COLLEGE NAMED FIRST ROBERT L. WASHINGTON SCHOLAR

Rev. Terri Ofori, the College Chaplain and Director of Spiritual Life at Bloomfield College, was one of three chosen as a Robert L. Washington Scholar by the Synod of the Northeast.

"I am honored to have been chosen as a Robert Washington Scholar and I am committed to honoring the legacy of the late Robert Washington and his family," said Rev. Ofori. "I am especially grateful to be the first woman, and a woman of color, in the Synod to receive this honor."

Robert (Bob) Lee Washington was a teacher, preacher, and activist. He dedicated his life to teaching, and creating opportunities to further the church, civil rights, and economic

equality. In the Presbyterian Church, he served in all levels: at the General Assembly, the Synod of the Northeast, the Presbytery of New York City, and the Session of Rendall Memorial Presbyterian Church in Harlem, NY. It is in his memory and honor that this program has been established.

In mid-January, the Synod's Committee on Representation met to review 12 Robert L. Washington Scholar applications and to select the inaugural group of Scholars. An extremely competitive process, the Committee was looking for Scholars who possess a strong commitment to exploring innovative ways of being gospel communities, are excited to lead gospel communities through the changing landscape of mainline Christianity, are interested in middle governing body leadership, and hold a desire to engage in personal and ecclesiastical transformation.

The Robert L. Washington Scholars program will provide resources for robust discernment regarding vocation, call, and abilities of service for the Church. Each year funding will be provided for three Scholars, which includes training through an approved leadership formation program.

The first Scholars chosen were Rev. Ofori; Rev. Mario Alberto Bolivar, the Associate Pastor for Technology, Youth, and Family of the Skaneateles Presbyterian Church; and Rev. Hyon Kim, who has served two Korean churches in the NY/NJ area and began as the Executive Presbyter and Stated Clerk of the Eastern Korean Presbytery in January 2017. These three Scholars will attend the Executive Leadership Certificate Program at McCormick Theological Seminary as well as retreats with Synod staff.

Apart from her Bloomfield College duties, Rev. Ofori currently serves as the Interim Minister of the United Church of Spring Valley, the Chaplain to the Synod Commission of the Synod of the Northeast PC (USA), and the Clergywoman Representative for the Presbyterian Women in the Synod of the Northeast Coordinating Team. She has served congregations throughout New Jersey and as a chaplain at Brown University and Wellesley. Rev. Ofori also served as Director of the Harvard University Memorial Church School under the tutelage of the late Reverend Professor Peter J. Gomes

The Rev. Ofori received her Th.M in Education and Spiritual Formation and a certificate in Transitional Ministry from Princeton Theological Seminary. She later received her M. Div. from Harvard University, and a M.A.T. in Cross Cultural Theology from Columbia International University. She is currently studying Christian Spirituality and Spiritual Direction at Fordham University

Rev. Ofori, alongside her husband, Dr. David Ofori, are co-founders of the P.A.Y.L.A. (Pan African Youth Leadership Academy), a non-profit organization dedicated to providing academic and leadership development skills to at risk youth.

Searching for the Moon

Note from Maxine Hunter: Olivia Orth, 2016-2017 Young Adult Volunteer stationed in Zambia that received one of PWSNE's YAV Grants, is a member of the Mayfield Central Presbyterian Church, Mayfield, New York if the Albany Presbytery. As a thank you to PWSNE she sent us this reflection of her experience.

Zambia is a country of great beauty, but that beauty can get covered up, drowned out, glossed over, and forgotten. I get caught up in the hard days. I get caught up in the eyes of my students who haven't eaten. I get caught up in the bruises that they try to hide. I get caught up in the lies that they try to tell themselves are true.

I get caught up in the sad days. I get caught up in fighting for a woman's right to not be pushed around by a man she refuses as her husband. I get caught up in half-stories that keep me up at night. I get caught up in consoling students who have lost their loved ones too early.

I get caught up in the unknown. I get caught up in deliberating about when I should listen and when I should speak. I get caught up in believing that stepping in was the right decision, when culturally I may have been wrong. I get caught up in wondering which of my students won't be able to afford to come to school tomorrow. I get caught up hoping that tomorrow is better.

I get caught up all the time. Sometimes, it is hard for me not to get caught up in the hard days, the sadness, and the unknown. Sometimes it feels like I am searching for ways to get caught up in the bad, but then something happens and I get caught up for a whole new reason.

I get caught up in a sunset. I get caught up in the calming beauty that a Zambian sunset brings, especially right now during the rainy season. I get caught up in the colors that dance across the sky the way water color paint does when your brush first touches a wet surface. I get caught up in the reminder that rain does not just bring mud, but also flourishing vegetation, crops, and vibrant rainbows. I get caught up in the beauty that surrounds me.

I get caught up when I'm teaching. I get caught up in that moment when the lightbulb goes off in the minds of my students. I get caught up in them finally feeling comfortable enough to ask me for help. I get caught up in my students telling me that they like when I answer their questions. I get caught up in my students telling me that they enjoy math for the first time in their school career.

I get caught up in the laughter. I get caught up in the joy on people's face when I greet them in Nyanja, or Tumbuka (which is much rarer). I get caught up in the smiles on my students' faces when I remember their names. I get caught up in the hugs from my host family when I haven't seen them in 24 hours. "Acknowledge others accomplishments and ask them to speak on them" Follow up with those who come to worship, sending cards or letters, in good weather leave door open to sanctuary to show welcome.

An opportunity was available to share time with others at meal time and at the hospitality room after or sharing your room with a group to socialize.


Hope you will plan to attend further gatherings to meet your sisters in Christ from all over.
