Let's continue to pray for God's grace and healing to all who suffer from physical, mental or spiritual ailments. Always remember that God is good all the time.



One day at a time.





Meditation

Resources in the Wilderness

The darkness overcomes you. It envelopes you like a heavy, water-laden blanket. It is cloying and all encompassing. The more you struggle to keep your head up, the more difficult it becomes, feeling like



something is pressing down on your neck to keep it bowed. When you try to open your mouth and yell for help, no words come out. You choke on the sound of your own voice. As you look around it appears that everyone else is going on with their lives. The sun seems to be shining on them. Yet you find yourself in this dark and desolate place, barren and alone, with no end in sight.

Depression is real. It is not prejudiced at all. It is an equal opportunity oppressor. It comes for the rich and the poor, the old and the young, the fat and the skinny, the pretty and the ugly. AND it is skilled at isolating you from everyone and everything that you hold dear. It isolates you from everything that gives you hope. The trick of depression is to get you to believe that you are all alone, that no one cares.

In I Kings 19, Elijah was in a place of wilderness that looked a lot like depression. He had just used his prophetic gifts in a MAJOR way when he defeated the prophets of Baal. Yet with one negative comment from Jezebel, Elijah began to doubt himself. He ran into hiding. He isolated himself. He focused on all that was going wrong in his life. He wanted to die.

When God spoke to Elijah, God instructed Elijah to get up and eat because he would need strength for the journey. Then God told Elijah Elijah was afraid and ran for his life.
When he came to Beersheba in Judah, he
left his servant there, while he himself
went a day's journey into the wilderness.
He came to a broom bush, sat down under
it and prayed that he might die.
"I have had enough, Lord, "he said. "Take
my life; I am no better than my
ancestors." Then he lay down under the
bush and fell asleep.

The Lord said, "Go out and stand on the mountain in the presence of the Lord, for the Lord is about to pass by."

The Lord said to him, "Go back the way you came, and go to the Desert of Damascus. When you get there, anoint Hazeal king over Aram. Also, anoint Jehu son of Mimshi king over Israel, and anoint Elisha son of Shaphat from Abe Meholah to succeed you as prophet...Yet reserve seven thousand in Israel- all whose knees have not bowed down to Baal and whose mouths have not kissed him."

about the resources he had available to him. God informed Elijah that there were 7,000 additional prophets who would help him. Further, God told Elijah to anoint Hazael, Jehu, and Elisha, all of whom would assist him.

Elijah was not alone. He had help!!!

Depression amongst Christians is a very real concern. There are those who serve among you on a weekly basis who suffer with depression. Many times you simply do not know because depression has isolated

them. Or you, yourself need an outside source to remind you of the resources that you have. For some, the resource is a trusted friend. For others the resource is the encouragement of family members. For others the resource is a kind word from a fellow congregant or prayers offered on your behalf. Yet, still for others the resource is the assistance of a good therapist who helps you sort through your feelings. Whatever the case, when you are in the midst of a depressive episode, give up the shame, stigma, and solitude of depression in order to embrace the resources that you have: family, friends, church family, therapists, and more. You are not alone; there are resources for your wilderness.

First Presbyterian Church Hackensack









We, like all churches, have been gathering and worshiping via social media since the end of last March. In our case, we've been using Facebook Live which has been working out with visitors joining us from Washington state to Chicago to Richmond and local. With the sanctuary unused, leadership felt it was the best time to address the falling plaster and cracking paint on the ceiling and walls. It took 3 ½ months but we went from fine to fantastic! A color specialist was used who suggested a new color scheme which would bring out the beauty of our knotty pine woodwork and ceiling medallions. With the new colors meant it was time to replace the pew pads that were so old that they contained horse hair and replace the window treatments that also hadn't been addressed since the 1970s. Of course, with improvements come the unexpected so the Presbyterian Women Hackensack paid for the new drapery.

We got a call from the **New York Blood Bank** who was looking for a donor center, and we opened our doors to them in May. Please give if you can as there is currently a terrible blood shortage in our country!

A children's **Summer Camp** needed a new larger home. We answered their need so they used our Fellowship Hall and kitchen this summer, Monday thru Friday. The only glitch was our commercial refrigerator decided it wasn't used to all the activity, so the Presbyterian Women stepped in and purchased a new refrigerator/freezer for the kitchen.

Presbyterian Women of Hackensack are looking forward to becoming a part of the larger new group: Presbyterian Women of the Northeast New Jersey!

Behind Closed Doors - a Virtual Exhibit



"Overpowering Adults"

depicts a cowering child and two overpowering adults. When there is more than one adult in the home, they are in agreement about the abuse of children, even if one of them is abused him/herself. The work measures 24" x 18" and is priced at \$400.



"Demeaning an Elder"

As senior adults diminish with age, many fall victim to the family members and or caretakers who take control of the victims' finances and possessions while keeping the elder(s) isolated and in increased dependence. Physical abuse and intimidation are often weapons of choice. The work measures 24" x 18" and is priced at \$400.



"Baby I'm sorry (Again)"

depicts intimate partner abuse. The well-dressed couple seem ideal in public but (s)he has fallen victim (again) to the physical abuse. He apologizes with roses, tells her he loves her and how she should not have provoked him. Intimate partner abuse can be hetero or homosexual and in teen-aged courtships. The work measures 30" x 30" and is priced at \$1200.00

Cathleen McCoy Bristol, a deacon at Trinity Presbyterian Church, is one of seven artists invited to submit three pieces of art depicting domestic violence that will be included in a virtual exhibit "Behind Closed Doors".

The video will be filmed on October 21, 2021, at Trinity Presbyterian Church, 5 High Street, Montclair, New Jersey and will feature the artists describing their work as well as purchase information. The title and topic "Behind Closed Doors" refers to the secrecy in which domestic violence thrives. It is a global issue which results in approximately 70,000 deaths annually. The target audience includes the victims, those who suspect victimization, and those who want to bring about awareness and change. A virtual exhibit allows privacy for victims who might not have the convenience or would risk exposure, harm and/or embarrassment as a result of attending an in-person forum. Cathleen notes that since domestic violence transcends all socio-economic levels, she chose to vary ethnicities in her subjects.

Cathleen is a former instructor at the Newark School of Fine and Industrial Art, the Junior Museum of the Newark Museum, Arts Unbound and Senior Studio. She has freelanced as a fashion illustrator, but her passion is as a painter, focusing mostly on portraits and figure work but also paints landscapes, still life and animals, usually done in oil or water color and most recently, acrylic paint. She is a frequent exhibitor, often works on a commissioned basis and has numerous works in private collections. Cathleen states, "I am awestruck by God's creative hand and find the colors of His palette inspiring for my use of color when painting people as well as landscapes...My faith in God has directed me to render various religious images for groups, churches, ministries and individual collections."


"Mutuality in Mission-Building a Kinder, Gentler World" by JoAnn Burrell

See to it that no one fails to obtain the grace of God; that no root of bitterness springs up and causes trouble, and through it many become defiled."

Hebrews 12:15

A lush façade of green grasses, bright flowers or thriving bushes can deceive us into thinking our garden is healthy. Without us knowing, roots spread underground, absorbing nutrients from the ground all around them. Then, an unwanted plant springs up and spreads. Weeds and invasive plants threaten the health of what we have been cultivating.

Roots of bitterness have been threatening the republic we have developed—a nation of the people for the people. Bitterness has been sitting below ground and surfacing through individuals' violent actions, or legislation that dehumanizes or disenfranchises individuals.



Take joy in the concept of "mutuality" in mission. None of the obstacles in our way –the pandemic, physical distancing, political divisiveness –will stop Presbyterian Women from our mission activities, because we are guided by God.

Covid-19 has provided endless areas for mission. Talk to and listen to parents, youth, young adults, and everyone you meet to find out the needs of the community. Continue doing the mission activities you did before the year 2020. You may need tore-design or adjust how you do them, or you can be adventurous and implement a whole new mission initiative! Remember, you are never alone when you do God's work.

Write down in a little book what you want to do and accomplish in 2021. This will be your Dream Sheet. In January of the next year, check off the goals that you met. If you do not meet some of the goals on your Dream Sheet, just do them in following years.


While planning goals and reflecting on accomplishments, it's also important to note that the last year has been a time of sadness, fear, distancing, closures, and lack of contact with other humans. During such trying times, you might want to do the following things to reduce stress and take care of yourself.

- I. Pray every day and meditate on pleasant thoughts.
- 2. Connect to loved ones and friends by telephone, text, email, and online meetings.
- 3. Do some stretching exercises. You can even do some stretches in bed or a chair.
- 4. Limit your caffeine intake. Too much caffeine can make you restless, anxious, and interfere with sleep.
- 5. Step outside or open a window, or just sit where you are inside, and take slow deep breaths. Inhale the beauty of the air around you.
- 6. Eat balanced meals including those fruits and veggies!
- 7. Get as much sleep as you can. Take a mental break during the day. Close your eyes; and think of something that makes you happy.
- 8. Pray often -at times you predetermine and as you feel inspired.

If you need ideas for mission subscribe to Horizon; read newsletters from your community, presbytery and synod; and talk with others about the needs of your community and the world.

Remember to listen to each other, and always be kind and have courage to speak up and speak out. Choose the things in life that will make you proud. Mission to God's children will make you proud, and it will ultimately change minds, and help those in need. The late Alex Trebek said, "We are trying to build a gentler, kinder society. And if we all pitch in just a little bit, we're gonna get there". When you engage in mission, you are building that kinder, gentler world.

In spite of the challenges that we have had to face and are still facing due to COVID-19 and its variants, we continue to worship and praise God. We are "Together In Service" and connecting with one another as a community of faith, despite the closed doors of our building.

Since March, 2020 teleconference has been our choice of assembly to host Sunday morning worship at 11:00 a.m, weekly Bible Study on Sunday mornings at 10:00 a.m. prior to worship service and Prayer Service on Wednesday evenings at 6:00 p.m.

The Order of Service at EAWPC continues to be a team effort coordinated by Pastor Doris Peterson and shared with members of the Session, Deacon Board and congregation serving as worship leaders. Communion is celebrated on the first Sunday of the month.

Teleconferencing has had a positive effect on EAWPC's worship experience and we will continue its use after in-person worship resumes.

Our weekly prayer service offers us an additional opportunity to offer prayers through Christ and we study scripture aided with a lesson which provides interpretation of the biblical text during bible study to assist us in becoming more relational with God and one another.

Nobody is good at everything, so we need each other. We were made to work in teams and we're better together. EAWPC's community of faith perseveres and is a powerful witness of God's love.




Old First Presbyterian Church – Newark






Through the power of unity, we remain Together in Service and continue to provide spiritual nurture to all who participate in our services as well as those who engage in our missions.

FPTC continues to worship virtually since March 2020.

Although we are not able to touch and hug one another, the order of worship, celebration of the Lord's Supper and local mission projects continue with appropriate adjustments, and members who have relocated to other countries and states or are homebound are able to participate. At the end of each worship service, worshipers engage in a time of lively fellowship and sharing. A significant outcome of the pandemic is the implementation of a Mid-Week Prayer Service led by PastorValencia Norman, that meets remotely on Wednesday evenings at 7:30 pm.

For the past 14 years, FP&T (along with Livingston, the Taiwanese and Upper Montclair Presbyterian congregations) has partnered with Newark's Memorial West Presbyterian Church in operating "The 7th Street Bistro" that extends Christian witness to community residents with meals and clothing, health/social service activities and warm fellowship. Since reopening, after a four-month closure in 2020 due to COVID, the Bistro has served weekly 'grab and go bag' lunches plus non-perishable grocery items (provided by the United Community Corporation) and fresh fruits/vegetables (provided by Harvest Ministries) to an average of 60 people weekly. Last September the Bistro Board arranged for representatives from the League of Women Voters and the 2020 Census Newark Field Office to assist participants with registration. A Flu Clinic with distribution of health/snack packs was held in November. FP&T continues to support programs of food insecurity such as MEND (Meeting Emergency Needs with Dignity) and the NI Community Food Bank through designated donations.

May we all embrace this prayer of confession shared by Pastor Valencia in a recent bulletin:

O God, redeem us, for we stand in need of forgiveness. We squander your mercy when we abuse your creation.

We slander our neighbors and seek not your peace.

Nations rise up against nations, and threats of violence and conflict fill the air. Those without work find no hope of relief.

The homeless wander without protection from harm. Christ had compassion on all those who suffered. Cleanse us of the sin that closes our hearts to our sisters and brothers.





And after the earthquake ... a sound of sheer silence. Then there came a voice ... that said, "What are you doing here?" (1 Kings 19:12-13)

Following the devastating Aug. 14 earthquake in Haiti, nearly 1,500 people are dead, thousands more injured and an unknown number still missing. Some 13,000 homes were destroyed and roads, bridges and communication systems damaged. Because Haiti is already facing endemic hunger and poverty, COVID-19, continuing civil unrest and the arrival of Tropical Storm Grace, Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) is providing emergency relief and short-term recovery through our established local partners and in collaboration with ACT Alliance. The PC(USA), through PDA, will remain active throughout the entire recovery process, accompanying our partners in the area as they determine long-term program needs and providing financial support for rebuilding and resilience.

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance is delivering immediate aid to those impacted by Hurricane Ida. Initial assessment suggests catastrophic destruction from the storm and widespread power outages that are expected to take weeks to fully restore.

PDA will continue to work with Presbyterian leadership as they respond to Hurricane Ida and remain engaged in the recovery from the hurricane season of 2020, during which seven named storms impacted the region. After initial needs are addressed, PDA will remain — providing emotional and spiritual care and Long-Term Recovery to address unmet needs.

The needs for the response will be great. God's people are once again called on to stand in the "GAP" — Give. Act. Pray.





STANDING TOGETHER

for the good of the community

In 2009 Carole Wheeler and her husband attended a meeting of the Presbytery of San Fernando, California Peacemaking Group.

It was there that they heard Lisa Patriquin talk about Muslim-Christian interfaith groups in southern California. At the time, Lisa was director of children's and family ministry at Glendale Presbyterian Church in Glendale, California. She

now serves as a board member of the Guibord Center, an interfaith organization in Los Angeles that she talked about during the meeting. She introduced the Muslim-Christian interfaith group **Standing Together** and its goals and programs. The Wheelers wondered, "Could this be something our church would embrace?"

A little background: In 2006, a group of leaders rom mainline Christian denominations and representatives from influential Muslim organizations in southern California came together to discuss common concerns to Christians and Muslims in post 9/11 America. Their goal was to increase mutual understanding,

dialogue, respect, appreciation and support of the sacred in each other.

Thus, the Christian-Muslim

Consultative Group (CMCG) was formed.

CMCG pairs mosques and Christian churches in order to promote learning, dialogue and advocacy between the members of the CMCG and their wider communities of faith, so that

- Christian and Muslim leaders learn more about one another's faiths and traditions, thus impacting how they present each other to their own communities;
- Christian and Muslin congregations are encouraged to engage in dialogue that leads to greater appreciation of each other;
- religious leaders can speak more effectively and with one voice, especially in times of crisis;
- local dialogue and cooperation lead to positive changes in Christian and Muslim attitudes toward each other.
 Following that first meeting where the Wheelers learned

about Standing Together, CMCG was invited to present their concept to the Adult Education Committee at the Wheeler's church. First Presbyterian Church of Newhall in Newhall, California. The pastor and committee were interested, so CMCG connected with representatives Jamshed and Faiqa Yazdani of the local mosque, The Unity Center. The Newhall Standing Together group

was born.

The CMCG had already developed a comprehensive study guide that members followed as the embarked on this journey of faith and fellowship. The study guide is still in use and continues to be modified as Standing Together groups share insights and inspirations that have developed over the years working with each other.

At Newhall's first meeting in January 2011,40 Christians and Muslims from the community came together and agreed to abide b certain guidelines. Those gathered agreed that they were there to:

- •Talk about our own faith tradition, speak from our experience and knowledge, and honor the knowledge and experience of all members of the group;
- Come to the discussions knowing disagreements on some matters might

arise, but they would be open to hearing the other side;

- listen for ways in which they were more alike than different:
- be renewed in their understanding of what makes each tradition and individual unique, and in the faithfulness of our Creator, God; and stand together.

This meeting resulted in a committed and dynamic Muslim-Christian fellowship that is very active in the community today, nine years later. To read more about the activities and experiences of the Newhall Standing Together Group as www.presbyerianwomen.org/stories

The thought that I think:

A Farewell to Aunt Ida

As I was completing this benedictory, I received the phone call that I dreaded for several days.

Aunt Ida who had been in hospice for the past week, had received her wings. She was 96.

Aunt Ida was the last of my mother's sisters. She was a

mother, a sister, an aunt and a pastor. She was a leader and a pioneer in the Apostolic Overcoming Holy Church of God.

One of my favorite stories is of how a desperate mother brought Aunt Ida her I6-month-old son; the baby had been unable to sleep for two days due to an unrelenting cough. The doctors were baffled, Aunt I da took the baby into her arms, rocked him and prayed until he fell asleep. When the baby awoke several hours later, the cough was gone. I was that baby.

She was a healer, a prophet and a peacemaker. She told me that I would be a minister at time in my life when I was as far from ministry as one might ever be.

As a budding theologian, I shared my belief that God created both good and evil. However, Aunt Ida deeply believed that God's presence was only of peace. Peace could not exist where any of Aunt Ida's children, the children of her community or children of God were hurting or being harmed. So, she was quick to initiate and moderate negotiations to return the peace of God. though our theological starting point differed, we shared an endpoint of "protection of the least of these."

She was fundamentalist and apostolic in her faith. Yet, because I openly respected her wisdom, she made space that I might share my thoughts on African-centered spirituality and cosmology. I especially remember one of our last conversations about justice and the children of God.

I shared my belief that , at the level of the spirit, newborns and those who were close to death bore a closer connection to God than the rest of us. We referenced Jeremiah 29:11. Aunt Ida preferred the King James Version, she often called it "the original Bible." Coincidentally, the KJV provides the better translation. "For I know the thoughts that I think toward you,

thoughts of peace, and not of evil, to give you an expected end. "not the plans that I have," but the thoughts that I think.

The writer harkens individuals in the Jeremiah community back to the time before they understood time as time, before they ever felt the wind blow and before they ever watched the trees bow in reverence. Back to a time, before they heard the lightning lap her hands in 2/4 time and before

thunder beat the drums of the ngoma lugundu. There, in the heavenly realm, was a conversation between each of them and their Creator. In this Afro-Asiatic cosmology, children abide with God in the heavens and select the parents to whom they would like to be born. Consequently they select the communities and the countries with whom they will be united. After sharing some "thoughts and thinkings" with the Creator, they are delivered to their selected families.

God knew there would be conflict with our government for the past few years. God knew about COVID-19. God knew about the rise in racial unrest. God knew knew how

it would affect your church and your family and our neighborhood. Yet rather than argue with you, God sent you, empowered to lift your voice and move your feet for such a time as this!

Aunt Ida reminded me often that my personal peace would be regularly disrupted in the pursuit of God's peace for the world. So might yours. As the seasons change, and the pandemic flares again, and as the administration in the White House changes and the country is filled with uncertainty, you should be filled with joy and resilience. You were created and sent to us, filled with power for such a time as this.

I am grateful for the peace spread by my aunt during her chosen time. Rest in power, Aunt Ida. I'll see you again soon.

God sent you, empowered to lift your voice and move your feet for such a time as this!

Rooted Resilience

No matter what comes...

I was guest preacher a few months ago in these weird days of this in-between time.

No one was there. I was alone in our upstairs bedroom, sermonizing virtually amid unpacked boxes in our combo rental home/storage unit.

The lectionary text landed in my heart with a loud thud.

The apostle Paul declared: I do not understand my own actions. Nothing good dwells within me. Evil lies close at hand.

You and I stand at the edge of Mordor in this season of weird fruit, this time of testing. Karma hurries in, even as we kick and scream, straining to slam the door. We face our mortality – and our sense of self-importance cannot protect us from COVID-19. We recognize the outlines of privilege and white supremacy, but our best intentions cannot paper over structural racism.

Social distancing gives us time to wrestle with our hearts, our actions, our memories. We hear the words of judgment in Romans 7. Are we left with anything beyond a religious wish dream?

Last summer I rolled my worn, tired bicycle to a local shop. The bike is at least two decades old. I hadn't climbed on it in years.

Now I have ridden all across Louisville and even over the river to southern Indiana. I have biked in the cool of the morning and the afternoon heat, in perfect weather and during the rain, hiking laboriously up endless hills and speeding across creek side flatlands. I don't ride very fast or very far. But...

I have worn myself out and kept riding.

I have wanted to stop and kept riding.

I have fallen and kept riding.

Right there, when I am spent, hunched over and undone, I have discovered the promise again. The end is not our faults and failings, not empty intentions and self-invested ideas. The end is ahead of us, where the light sparkles and the air is sweet and the Spirit sings. The end is the rescue and release of the living God.

There is more than these mortal bodies ad more than our death-dealing ways. There is deliverance.

Twenty-five years ago I remember placing our two youngest children together in the bathtub. They are only two

years apart. It was easy to put them in the tub at the same time, and I would sing to them:

Let all things now living, a song of thanksgiving, To God our Creator, triumphantly raise, Who fashioned and made us, protected and stayed us, By guiding us onto the end of our days.

when I am

again.

I hoped they would learn that life is all about grace and gratitude, rooted first not in our efforts and achievements (or our messes and failures) but in God's providence.

I hoped that they would learn to trust.

Life doesn't let us off the hook. Right now in this moment there are babies to be bathed, children to be comforted, strangers to be welcomed, unheard voices to be honored, good news to be shared and justice work worth every ounce of our energy to be done.

Perhaps one of the gifts of this strange season is a resilience rooted in God's presence, a determination that comes on the other side of loss and sadness.

Perhaps right now, even in our tears and our failings, lies the bedrock or our faith: a confidence that God is with us and for us molding, remaking, forming anew.

When I was in seminary every day I would walk by the campus banner that stood just in front of the central building. It was there on the way to the dining hall and class. At the time the message seemed very simple, but as the years pass, I now give thanks for its foundation:


