Greetings to my Presbyterian Women sisters in the Synod of the Northeast. 2023 is upon us and my term ends in July of this year. It has been a joy to serve as your moderator during the dark days of COVID 19. It is regrettable that I didn't have the opportunity to visit all the PWP's and many other churches who don't have active

PWP's. Now with things getting better, I might take a trip or two.

The Gathering for this year will be held on July 14th -15th 2023 where I would hand over, gladly, the moderatorial responsibilities to the new Moderator. We are called to serve for a term to do God's work and hand of the reins to someone else called into the position. Look for the schedule in the newsletter.

I believe that God places people in certain positions at such a time as this, which is the right time to do the necessary work. I assumed the position of Moderator on July 30, 2020 at the height of the COVID when everything was closed. We had no choice but to go virtual; fortunately, I had the technical skills to pivot to online and with the help of five people, I was able to hold our first ever Fall Gathering, virtually, in October 2020 with 60 registrants (the registration was online only, which I did) and attendees at various times appearing on the screen. I was able to get the entire program to work without a hitch. My entire term in office was virtual. Every program was virtual and registration was virtual with the exception of 2022, which was done by the registrar.

There was a call for masks for a region of the country of Liberia, so I put a call out throughout the Synod PW. Rita Hooper and her team of women sewed masks for adults and children to the tune of four hundred and eight masks that my church took the responsibility of shipping to Liberia. Thank you Rita and her sewing team. This is how we support PW with our talents, time and money through donations to the many offerings of PW. Remember PW is the largest financial contributor to PCUSA with all our offerings. We have clout, let's exercise our clout in support of mission in and around our communities.

As the COVID wore on and people were feeling down, I organized an online spiritual retreat via Zoom. The purpose was to lift people's spirits so everyone can feel the presence of God; knowing that God is still with despite the situation.

The planning sub-committee of the CT is working on revising the Coordinating Team since there are members who have not been present all. The revision is on progress and will be presented at the Gathering in July.

I have enjoyed my term as the Moderator of PW for the Synod of the Northeast and have served faithfully and gladly. It is time for me to move on to other services in the name of God. Let's keep the light shining bright on the achievements of Presbyterian Women and future success.

As the song says: "We are called to be light for the Kingdom, we are called to act with justice, we are called to love tenderly, we are called to serve one another, to walk humbly with God" Let us not forget that we serve a great God of love who cares tenderly for the whole world and God has entrusted us with healing the world. I say go forth and serve God with joy and gladness.

If no one is coming from your area, please help out by sending the Lighthouse photo from your State.

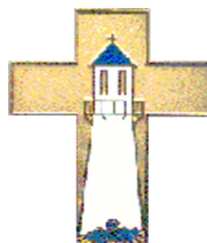

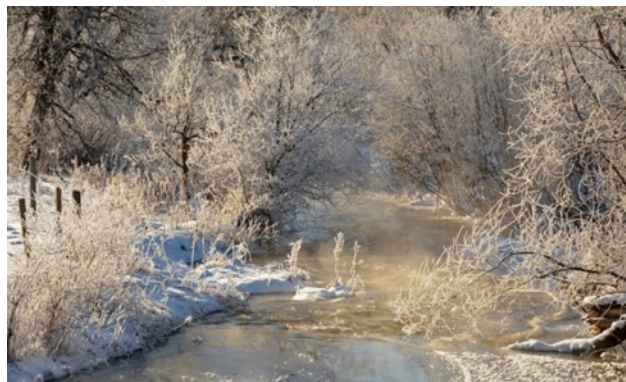

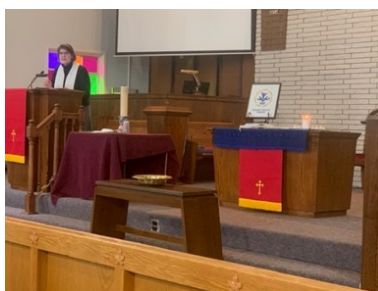
Rev. Susan Frost from Park Presbyterian Church led us in morning worship and a thank offering dedication. Next we were treated to a wonderful tour of Ovid's thrift store. And several women returned later to make their own purchases!

Our program speaker was Deborah Keuhner, Executive Director of the Potter's Hand Foundation in Corning, NY. This organization offers a safe and secure residential environment and is making a difference in lives of women trapped by the oppression of human trafficking. Deborah certainly opened our hearts and minds and made an impression on all of us. We left with thankful hearts knowing that this program of "embracing women - restoring hope" was an opportunity for women here in our region.

We all enjoyed a lunch of hearty soups prepared by Ovid's women and breads brought by many to be shared with all. Following lunch it was time for "Hope in A Purse," our hands on mission activity. We had gathered purses and the list of needful items prior to the Gathering. All were brought to Ovid and arranged/piled high in the center of several tables. We set to work...fun actually... filling purses as we all took turns selecting a purse and then filling it with the several items. By the end we had filled at least 75 purses which then went to The Potter's Hands, Survivor Advocacy Center of the Finger Lakes and other agencies supporting women in crisis situations or as they leave incarceration or graduate from substance abuse programs.

All in all it was a wonderful day and we are looking forward to a Spring Gathering sometime in May.

PW of Albany Mission Giving

Presbyterian Women (PW) in the Presbytery of Albany are proud of the generosity of the women in our Presbytery who stepped up to enable us to make large contributions to special charitable requests in 2022. At our Spring Gathering \$1426 was donated to the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance Fund for Ukraine. Our Fall Gathering freewill offering brought in \$379 to support the Rural Women's Assembly, an event sponsored by the Rural Migrant Ministry that brings rural women together with resources that can assist them. The special fundraiser for the MoonCatcher Project yielded \$3265.

In September the sewing collective building in Chituka, Malawi, sponsored by the MoonCatcher's Project was broken into and sewing machines, fabrics, and completed menstrual kits were stolen. One of our women quickly offered a matching grant up to \$2000 to raise money to replace those items. She ended up donating the full amount despite the \$2,000 goal not having been reached.

A native of Chituka Village is a member of Hamilton Union Presbyterian Church which has a mission partnership with the village. This connection prompted large monetary donations from their mission fund and their PW group which donated the proceeds from their freewill offering at its Christmas Potluck Luncheon. Smaller donations were made by the PW in First Presbyterian Church of Valatie and an individual from Westminster PC. We are glad for all the support for mission both locally and around the world.

BIRTHDAY OFFERING -collected and dedicated in the spring

The Birthday Offering and the Thank Offering were continued in 1988 when the northern United Presbyterian Women and the southern Women of the Church united to form Presbyterian Women.

The Birthday Offering dates back to 1922 and was formed as women sought an appropriate way to celebrate what the Women's Auxiliary meant to them. The members of Women of the Church gave a penny for each year of their lives. Up to five projects (in amounts from \$75,000 to \$150,000) are chosen each year for funding to meet major mission needs.

THANK OFFERING – collected and dedicated in the fall

The Thank Offering began in 1888 when women were urged to give over and above their usual contribution to the Women's General Missionary Society of the UPCNA, thus coming from the northern Presbyterian church. Projects are awarded grants (\$5,000-\$50,000) to help hospitals, schools, health programs, domestic violence shelters, child and youth development programs, hunger programs, homeless shelters and more. At least 40% supports health ministries each year.

LEAST COIN OFFERING – collected year-round, dedicated in the fall

This is a global, ecumenical women's prayer movement. Prayers are offered for peace, justice and reconciliation in families, communities and worldwide. Women set aside the least coin of their local currency as a symbol of the prayer. This allows women of all backgrounds and means to be equal partners in justice and peacemaking. Every year, the FLC Fund is disbursed as grants for post-secondary education and training for women, for projects that empower women and girls, advocates for their rights, works to end gender-based violence and poverty, and provides relief in times of disasters.

Circle of Prayer

A booklet of prayer "Circle of Prayer" is used as prayer is offered and the least coin is set aside. 20-24 meditations and prayers are written by women around the world and published by the FLC every two years.

New Look for PWSNE Coordinating Team

The PWSNE CT (Coordinating Team) may soon be sporting a new look. A team of four women – Virginia Champlin (Moderator-Elect), Jane Kim (Search Committee Moderator), Joanne Schnaudt (Chair, By Laws Committee), and Adebisi Shofu (Moderator) – authorized by the CT and Business Meeting Voting Delegates in October 2022 – has been reviewing how to streamline and organize a better functioning CT while not losing our purpose to include and serve the women in our Synod. Each step of the process is being approved by the CT.

This has become necessary as in recent years some women elected to the CT have not attended CT meetings, reported on their activities, or responded to correspondence from CT leaders. Also, we “lost” 3 PWP’s when the 7 New Jersey PWP’s merged into 4 new PWP’s, and we “lost” 6 PWP’s who have disbanded, leaving only 13 active PWP’s to provide candidates for the CT and help finance PWSNE.

No one who is currently serving will be “fired.” However, some positions will remain as active CT members and others will serve as part of a team under a CT leader. Some terms may change until we can establish a 3 year rotating schedule to ensure that the same number of women rotate off the CT each year.

The CT met on Wednesday, January 25th and approved the draft of a proposed CT. There is still work being done to finish the structure of the CT. In the meantime we are working on updating job descriptions and organizing the election rotation schedule. When they are approved, we will work on updating the By Laws.

Your PWP Moderators will be kept up to date via email until the Business Meeting at the Triennial Gathering July 14-15, when the final proposal will come before the Voting Delegates.

WOVEN THROUGH OUR LIVES

With loving memories of Ginnie Miller

Many of you may already know that Virginia (Ginnie) Miller passed away in October 2022. A Memorial Service was held at her church in Pennsylvania, where Ginnie has lived with her daughter for several years.

In passing the sad news around, it was clear that Ginnie would be greatly missed. Her warm personality and contagious laugh will be remembered by all who spent any time with her.

Ginnie served as Moderator of Elizabeth PWP and served in many capacities on the PWSNE Coordinating Team over the years.

I met Ginnie in the 1980's...I can't remember where and when...but I do remember her willingness to help, her attention to detail and doing the job correctly, and the joy she carried with her as she did her work. That joy was spread around to all. I also remember the "pranks" she played on me when I was Synod PW Moderator in the 1990's. Two of these still stand out vividly in my mind. The night before I was to be installed as Moderator, we had a rehearsal to be sure we all knew where to stand and what to say. Ginnie had invited me to a "party" in someone's room, which was occurring while I was at the rehearsal. When I finished, I made my way to the party, and upon entering the room, Ginnie addressed me as "Your Highness." I jokingly held out my hand and told her to kiss my ring (there was no ring on my hand). The next day Ginnie handed me a small box all wrapped up, and upon opening it, I found a "ring" made from a red Jolly Rancher candy and tightly wound paper. I put it on my finger and she announced that I was now the "Popina." That nickname lasted throughout our years together.

The second prank also occurred at the Desmond during a November CT meeting. The cost of food at the Desmond was quite high, so I arranged with a restaurant across the street (read 8 lane highway) to reserve tables for us for dinner. Now picture twenty plus women crossing an 8-lane highway, in the rain, before the traffic signal changed. We enjoyed our meal and for dessert the restaurant served donuts. However, they were leftover Halloween decorated donuts and a bit stale. Move forward to the next year when we decided to pay the extra \$ for dinner and not risk life and limb crossing the highway. We enjoyed a wonderful dinner at the Desmond, and at dessert

time the staff brought out yummy looking eclairs and put one in front of everyone except me. They brought me a plate with a stale donut on it. My friend Ginnie brought one donut to the meeting, left it out on her dresser overnight so it would be good and dried out, and got the staff to serve it to me.

In the past few years, we enjoyed long phone conversations about once a month while we were quarantined. Ginnie was a special woman who loved her family, her church and singing in the choir, and our PW gatherings. We miss you Ginnie but know you are with Bob and probably playing pranks on the other angels.

One of the projects Ginnie worked on was a Tapestry woven with various colored threads representing leaders of PWSNE over the years. So now, we weave Ginnie's color...red...the color of the "stone" in my ring... to represent Ginnie... into the Tapestry.
