Vice Moderator's Message

Do Everything in Love

This was the theme of the Presbyterian Women 2024 Churchwide Gathering, held this past August in St. Louis, Mo.

It was somewhat difficult to remember the 'Great Commandment' when you arrive from the airport and your luggage is missing for a few days; or you waited in a long line for a buffet style meal scheduled for 800 women for an interminable amount of time; or you asked for a vegetarian meal, only to receive a bowl of lettuce; or your flight home was changed to a later time! (The positives are that I had to purchase two new shirts, lost some weight due to less food ingested, and had a better plane on the way home.

In the New Testament, specifically Luke 10:27, it is written. "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself." This is the Great Commandment. Doesn't it truly exemplify, or bring to life, the theme of the Churchwide Gathering? I think when we look at other scripture, we have to have patience (waiting in line), we have to learn to hold our tongues (the tongue is mightier than the sword) and we should accept people where they are – we haven't walked in their shoes (loving our neighbor as ourselves).

Some attendees, myself included, arrived a day early to attend the Business meeting as Voting Representatives. Issues voted upon included revisions to the Bylaws for language changes, to include two positions to the Administrative Committee, to remove the position of Finance Committee Chair, and to reduce the number of synod representatives to a regional model of five representatives (down from 12 representatives).

Of importance is that the Synod of the Northeast Voting Representatives, along with other voting representatives, strongly felt that the reduction in number of synod representatives from 12 to five, and utilizing a regional model that has been utilized in the Search Committee to create these 'regions', would create numerous problems, including a lack of communication, fellowship, and increased cost to the Synods. This mo-

tion failed. It was discussed that the rationale behind the motion was that first, volunteers were minimal and contributions to Churchwide have declined. It was brought to my attention from our own Sueliu, that of the 16 Synods, three of the Synods did not submit nominations for their representatives, and of those submitted, six individuals declined the nomination.

A subsidiary motion was submitted, seconded and passed. This motion created a rotation scheduled where 1/3 of the Synod Representatives would attend the Churchwide business meeting the first year, the next 1/3 of the Synod Representatives would attend the Churchwide business meeting the second year, and the last 1/3 of the Synod Representatives would attend the Churchwide business meeting the third year of their service. With this model, the number of Synod Representatives remains intact. The Gathering was a wonderful event from the Plenary sessions, the music and the fellowship. I was able to sit and close my eyes and listen to the hymns sung by a chorus of 800 women. Wow! What a moving experience.

The messages of love were spoken from women of different status, different walks of life and different forms of service, all spoken in love. Cindy Kohlmann, the Connectional Presbyter of New Castle Presbytery and Co-Moderato of the 223rd General Assembly (2018) spoke on "Who Needs a Heart?". Yung Me Morris, Spiritual Care and Bereavement Care Coordinator at Heartland Home Care & Hospice spoke on the topic, "Did You Eat Yet? The Ancient Tradition of the Agape Love Feast and the Mutuality of Korean Hospitality." Evelyn Torres, Pastora, La Iglesia Presbiteriana en Lares, Puerto Rico delivered a heartful message of life in Puerto Rico. And I would be remissed if I didn't mention the wonderfull CeCe Armstrong, Associate Pastor of St. James on James Island in Charlston, S. Carolina and Co-Moderator of the 226th General Assembly (2024), who preached on "Love Always..." (and in all ways???)

Contributions of sanitary products were stacked feet high. Over \$20,000.00 was collected in gift cards to be distributed to two needy organizations. Over \$92,000 was collected last year for Fellowship of the Least Coin. What a wonderful way to 'Do Everything in Love'.

Workshops attended were on the Commission on the Status of Women, led by our own Magdelene Lewis. Another workshop was MMIWR - Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Relatives. What a travesty to learn of the numerous Indigenous Women, and now their relatives, who go missing each year – and remain missing due to the lack of investigative resources or interest! Another workshop was based upon the book entitled, "Walking Through the Valley", which discussed 'womanist explorations'. (You can google these organizations or books for more information.)

Speaking of books::: Since I registered early, I was gifted with a book by the Church-wide committee entitled, "Legacy", by Helen Harano Christ. I did purchase "Walking Through the Valley" at the Presbyterian Bookstore at the Gathering, and our Synod Moderator, Virginia Champlin gifted the book, "Annie, the Kitchen Queen", to the attendees at the Synod Luncheon.

Speaking of the Synod Luncheon, Synod Moderator, Virginia Champlin exemplified "Love", by inviting the women from the Synod of Alaska-Northwest to the luncheon. As I close, I would like to extend a heartfelt, Thank You, to our Moderator, Virginia Champlain, for exemplifying love in her first year of service as our Moderator of the Synod of the Northeast. It has been an honor to serve as your Vice-Moderator.

THE CHURCHWIDE GATHERING – A DIFFERENT PERSPECTIVE

Eleven gatherings in person, one Zoom of the Business Meeting in 2021, and now one online gathering.

Participating in the gathering online is quite different than being there in person, as anyone who has participated in a worship service online can tell you. You feel like the proverbial fly on the wall watching, observing, absorbing, participating somewhat, but you're not able to share the experience afterwards.

Fifty-eight women/women's groups participated in the Churchwide Gathering online. Many of us kept the camera on, so we could see each other, but too many did not and showed only a black block of space for themselves. We were muted, but we connected in our own way by waving to each other when we came on and signed off each day. I recognized only three of us from the Northeast: Doris Christians, Kris Gerling, and myself.

We participated in the four plenary sessions and in the Sunday morning worship service. I know I appreciated being recognized by Emcee Shari Stump, who called us the Zoomys

We had a view of the stage only, but could see the backs of the heads of the women in the first few rows. It was like we were sitting in the third row with all of you. The words to the hymns were put on our screens so we could sing along with the rest of the women in attendance. Churchwide Staff Stephanie Patterson set this up and emailed a copy of the program book ahead of time so we could participate in any responsive readings. The still photos on Facebook allowed us to see some of the women and activities. I recognized Rhonda, Alpha, Jo Ann, and Virginia in a few of those photos.

You could tell what part of the country some women were from. Those eating breakfast online were from the west coast where the program began for them at 6:30 AM PDT. Those of us on the east coast started later (and we could sleep an hour later) at 9:30 AM – so we enjoyed coffee or tea while watching the program. And, no, Shari, no one was wrapped in a towel from just stepping out of the shower. (Unless those were the women in the black boxes!) I don't know about pajamas, though.

Thank you to Steph and her staff for giving us the opportunity to hear those dynamic speakers, learn about PW's involvement in missions around the world, and get to meet our new leaders.

I do hope that Churchwide, and also our Synod PW, will consider having an online presentation at all future gatherings so ALL women can have the opportunity to participate.

RACIAL EQUITY DIALOGUE (RED) TRAINING WORKSHOP

Wednesday, August 7th,2024 marked a new beginning in the life of Presbyterian Women, USA. After nearly 10 years of planning, discussions, research, and prayer, the first Racial Equity Dialogue (RED) training workshop was held in St. Louis, Missouri. Twenty-five women representing 15 Synods and diverse backgrounds eagerly anticipated this opportunity to learn more about promoting racial-ethnic equity in their communities.

PW staff person Stephanie Paterson and Catrelia Steele Hunter and Nina Khouri from the Synod of the Mid-Atlantic facilitated the day long workshop which included presentations by PW leadership, small group discussions, education on inclusive language, and LOTS of planning.

The purpose of the Racial Equity Dialogue (RED) Group is to fulfill the PW purpose by "building an inclusive, caring community" that works for justice & peace using dialogue as a tool for building relationships among & between women from different racial-ethnic groups and backgrounds. Each RED representative is charged with developing a RED Team in their Synod. Ideally, RED teams will consist of at least two women from each presbytery with an overall goal to have representation from racial ethnic groups found in their community.

The RED representatives for the Synod of the Northeast are Magdalene Lewis from the Presbytery for New York City and Donna Vize Wasik from the Presbytery for Southern New Jersey. Magdalene and Donna are excited and humbled to have the opportunity to gather with our PW siblings in building a RED community. They will be reaching out to PW Presbytery Moderators to identify potential RED team participants and begin team building.

I'm slowly acclimating to life without Wegmans, but the good news is that in most regards Detroit is an awful lot like Rochester but with better Arab food. The roads are terrible but I can get amazing hummus and <u>Dot's pretzels</u> at the corner store, so I suppose it balances out in the end.

I have unpacked fully and settled into my new apartment and new office, both of which are great. Puerto Rico

"Serve wholeheartedly, as if you were serving the Lord, not people" (Ephesians 6:7)

A soft, balmy breeze gently blows across the azure waters, softly rustling the fronds of nearby palm trees. The waves wash across the sand, depositing sparkling gems, waiting for the would-be collector hoping to discover a priceless treasure. The white sand is warm and smooth, inviting a body to simply sit and meditate on the mesmerizing motion of the tide. Adding to this breathtaking experience is the fragrance of coconut oil from nearby sunbathers and the inviting aroma of fresh pineapple and mango sold by locals on the beach. Indeed, this must be the definition of "paradise". And the Caribbean Island of Puerto Rico is aptly described as such by the would-be tourists and global economists and real estate moguls looking for cheap properties with generous tax breaks.

Over the course of its history, despite its being dubbed la "Isla del Encanto", the "Island of Enchantment", this nation has been a place of challenge and hardship, a place where only tourists enjoy the above-mentioned pleasures that Puerto Rico has to offer. Many locals find themselves working diligently and relentlessly for insulting wages, to be able to provide these luxuries for tourists. It is this tourism that was supposed to be the promised panacea to rebuilding the anemic economy and unstable government.

Unfortunately, from the time of its discovery by Europeans until the present, history and circumstances would have an impact on these islanders that would catapult them into a 21st Century "bottoming out".

They call themselves "los perdidos y los olvidados", "the lost and the forgotten". In September 2017, an historic natural disaster made landfall in Puerto Rico. Between September 19–21, 2017, Hurricane María devastated the entire island of Puerto Rico and caused a major humanitarian crisis. Originally as a powerful Category 5 hurricane, Maria was the strongest storm to impact the island in 90 years. The island was all but completely devastated, resulting in months of the absence of running water, total black-outs, extremely limited healthcare, inaccessible roads, landslides, loss of life, and the list continues. Although the actual duration of the storm was four days, the continued rain throughout the month of September and into early October wreaked havoc on the already fragile infrastructure of the island. With little US governmental assistance, the residents were in complete survival mode, and in a sense, remain as such today.

The Matthew 25 initiative charges us as Christians to minister to the "least of these". Specifically, one of the maxims of the initiative is to "eradicate systemic poverty", Wherein as this might not be realized in our lifetimes, we must at least work toward that challenge. And that, my brothers and sisters is exactly what First Presbyterian Church of Elmira NY did when it partnered with Iglesia Presbiteriana en Lares, PR.

This partnership has lasted for over 6 years and remains strong. There is mutual understanding and love, shared challenges and successes, transparency and trust. The critical factor is not about rebuilding homes, schools, and churches, indeed, all particularly important. What this partnership demonstrates is "building relationships". Over the years, there have been six teams from the Elmira and nearby churches, and at least fifteen separate fact-finding trips to Lares made by Kathy Menges (FPC Elmira) and Juana (Joanne) Tunison (FPC Horseheads). Each time we are welcomed with grace and love, fed with fellowship and food. We share abundant laughter and at time, tears.

One recent trip made by Kathy and Juana took us to Utuado and San Sebastián, two rural mountain communities like Lares, where a partnership might develop. Kathy and Juana are in the process of facilitating another trip to the island in midwinter of 2025, to visit Lares and meet with the pastors and elders of Utuado and San Sebastián. to ascertain need and interest. 



In appreciation of Ardelle Stewart 's Life

On Aug 11, Ardelle Stewart passed away after having had a stroke a week prior. Most of us don't remember a time when Ardelle wasn't active at the congregation, Presbytery and Synod levels of PW. She provided music at many events and saw to it that the PW Purpose was the cornerstone of our programs.

She was a member of PW in The First Presbyterian Church of Valatie. Her group provided a "Gifts of Women Sunday" program every year. Ardelle insisted that that the PW Purpose be read each year at that event. In 1987, Ardelle was one of a small group of women at the church who advocated for starting a PW group. A PW "Enabler" came to speak to them about how to start a group. Besides her PW activities, Ardelle was the organist at her church and played in the morning of the day she had the stroke.

She was a long-time leader of the PW in the Presbytery of Albany Coordinating Team and was Moderator from 2004-2007. We had a PWA Coordinating Team meeting on the Friday before her stroke. She was full of ideas, as always.

Ardelle held several positions on the PWSNE Coordinating Team. She was present at most PWSNE events and many Churchwide Gatherings.

Ardelle's family included her late husband Bruce, late daughter Caren, daughter Patricia Porter and granddaughter Nicole, whose accomplishments she was very proud of plus her late Poodle, Coco who she was devoted to.

Her interests were cooking, music plus travel to historical sights and cruises with her daughter Caren. She ushered at the MacHadyn Theatre in Chatham. Ardelle enjoyed musical productions in person and on TV and the "The Big Bang Theory" TV series

Ardelle was a good and caring friend to many and only missed her 65th college reunion because she was sick the weekend it was held.


Well into her 90s Neola continued to encourage women to get involved in mission and Bible study. Details of Neola's life can be found here:




