Since we last gathered, many of you attended the Triennial in St. Louis where it was a time to look at the way we operate with by-laws amendments, a time to share program ideas around the table or through speakers and an opportunity to recharge our spiritual batteries for the start of another busy year.



Last fall we gathered by zoom and examined three spiritual practices of newness to inspire and equip us for the year ahead. By Spring we met in person for the first time since before Covid, thanks to the women of Old First Presbyterian Church in Newark. Grace and Peace!

November 1 is recognized as All Saint's Day. That's the day set aside to remember special people who have been influential in our faith. Often we think of those who have transitioned to the "church triumphant," part of the heavenly choir and henceforth remembered as Saints. Nevertheless, Jesus' exhortation as recorded in Mark's Gospel chapter 12:28-34, wants us as Christians to remember that Saints are folks like you and me who love from the depth of our souls. And this love probably makes no sense to outsiders.

I am reminded of a story I read in an old edition of Guideposts magazine. A woman decided to earn her master's degree later in life. She found it necessary to commute several times a week from Victory, Vermont to the State University in Burlington, almost a hundred miles away. Coming home late at night, she would see an old man sitting by the side of her road. He was always there, in below-freezing temperatures, in stormy weather – no matter how late she returned. He just sat there in a folded chair. The snow caked on his cap and jacket as if he were merely another bush on the side of the road. She often wondered what brought him to that same spot every evening. Perhaps it was a stubborn habit, private grief or a mental disorder. Finally, she asked a neighbor of hers, "Have you ever seen an old man who sits by the road late at night?"

"Oh, yes," said her neighbor, "many times." "Is he a little touched upstairs? Does he ever go home?"

The neighbor laughed and said, "He's no more touched than you or me. And he goes home right after you do. You see, my husband doesn't like the idea of you driving by yourself out late all alone on these back roads, so every night he walks out to wait for you. When he sees your tail lights disappear around the bend, and he knows you're okay, he goes home to bed."

The opportunities 'to love your neighbor' are almost endless in every neighborhood – even ours. There are a dozen ways or more for us to help people if we are willing to be the neighbor God calls us to be.

That's good news for ALL Saints!

Let us pray: Lord, you have said that to truly love you then I must also love my neighbor, which can be difficult when we disagree or lifestyles clash. Yet in overcoming those difficulties it is possible to see the miracle that you love someone like me. Teach us to love, Lord, as you have loved us that this world might be a better neighbourhood in which to live and share. Help us to put aside preconceptions about other people, because that alters our behaviour, and simply accept that they, like us, are precious in your eyes. Lord, teach us to be good neighbours, not just to the folk who live nearby but to everyone that we meet, to see the best in, and want the best for all your precious children, who might one day return to their Father's house and the warmth of your embrace.


Embracing the PW Churchwide Gathering theme, "Do



kind, not sarcastic, not rude, not




framed Rev. Wright's message of introspection.

Fall Gathering Offering 2024

This year we will support an outreach to victims of Hurricane Helene at Camp Grier in North Carolina.

At <u>Camp Grier</u> in McDowell County, North Carolina, (30 minutes east of Asheville), years of building up local relationships around outdoor recreation opportunities meant local people were familiar and comfortable with the camp. While Camp Grier itself didn't sustain much damage following Helene, the nearby town of Old Fort, North Carolina, suffered widespread destruction. Power and water were restored to Camp Grier about a week after Hurricane Helene and the camp welcomed anyone to come for showers, meals, water, laundry and charging electronics. Camp Grier prepared for a group of about 300, so they were well-stocked to care for their community. Jason McDougald, who serves as executive director, estimated they were serving over 100 meals a day for the first few days, with dozens coming for showers and lodging.

"Being in an outdoor community helps you prepare for things like this – it teaches you resilience and adaptability. There's rain, or the power's out? Time for a new plan!" McDougald said. He acknowledged the fatigue of being in a disaster zone and was glad to provide an escape for his neighbors. "They feel comfortable coming up here. Camp is approachable," he said.

Prayer of Thanksgiving

We pray, O God, for your church as it exists in every land. May we learn from the earthy faith of our Native American brothers and sisters, and may we care for the land and all those who call it home.

Come, Holy Spirit, dwell in these breads and in this cup that they might be for us the body and blood of Christ. Come, dwell in your people of every land and language that we might be united with one another to be the body of Christ in every corner of the world today. Amen.



On Sunday, November 3, 2024, in a special worship service followed by a formal reception, First Presbyterian Church in Newark welcomed Rev. Dr. Carol Lynn Patterson as Transitional Pastor/Teacher Elder. The service was led by Rev. Doris Glaspy, retired pastor, who has served our church as moderator since 2022.

A graduate of Princeton Theological Seminary and Drew University,

Rev. Dr. Patterson's experience includes serving as a member of the pastoral team at Calvary Baptist Church in Morristown, New Jersey, also as Chief Evangelism Officer of Setting the Captives Free Ministries. A teacher by nature, she is the creator of "God's Glory... Our Story", a biblically-based and culturally relevant curriculum that parallels salvation history with Black history. She is also the author of "Deceit", an empowering and liberating novel about resilience after setbacks that reminds people they are never stuck in any circumstance. Rev. Patterson is frequently invited to preach and teach for churches, associations and conferences with emphases on evangelism, social justice and discipleship; and she is committed to preaching, teaching and demonstrating a liberating gospel.

Prior to receiving the call to preaching the gospel, Dr. Carol led a successful career in multicultural marketing communications and was recognized by EBONY Magazine as an Outstanding Woman in Marketing & Communications, the Morris County Branch of the NAACP with the Community Leaders Social Justice Award, and Business News NJ as one of the Top 10 Women in the State.



Day 1, PM. Shari Stump, comedian and MC, opened Plenary. Shari welcomed us and made us laugh throughout the program. Jeanette Huie, Chair of the CWG 2024 and Susan Jackson-Dowd, Executive Director PW, Inc. welcomed us to St. Louis and the St. Louis Convention Center. The land acknowledgement was provided by Jessica Maudlin, Associate for Sustainable Living and Earth Care Concerns, Presbyterian Hunger Program, followed by the Processional of United States of America Mission Experience (USAME) 2019 participants, United States of America Mission Experience (USAME) 2023 participants, 2018-2021 Moderator and Vice Moderator for Mission Relationships, 2021-2024 Moderator and Vice Moderator, current Board of Directors members, and Board of Directors members whose term ends in 2024, and PW Staff. Greetings were given by Liz Rolf Kanerva, Associate Presbytery Leader, Gidding-Lovejoy Presbytery. Welcome message from the Presbyterian Mission Agency, Diane Moffett, President & Executive Director. Our theme color for Thursday is to wear black. "Thursdays in Black" is a world Council of Churches movement that encourages individuals to wear black as a symbol of their commitment to bring about a world without rape & violence against women.



Day 1 Theme was "What's love got to do with it?"

This gives us a lot to think about. We should honor Presbyterian Women past; we honor the journey of sacred places; we honor the journey through a pandemic, grief, moments of joy, life changes, lives begun, lives completed; we honor God who travels these roads, faces these trials, and celebrates these moments with us. We are filled with hope as we look forward into Presbyterain Women's work in the world. We are filled with hope for how the Spirit will move us and the days we are given.

Our keynote speaker was **Cindy Kohlmann** Correctional Presbyter of New Castle Presbytery & Co-Moderator of the 223rd GA 2018. The title of her presentation was "*Who Needs a Heart?* Ms. Kohlmann reminded us that we are called to love our neighbors as ourselves, and how do we confront our neighbors who cause harm. The plenary was closed with prayer from Linda Lee, CWG Plenary Team Chair, sending us off with joy, excitement, and hope for a new tomorrow.

We learned that Love really has everything to do with it!



Day 2, AM. Our theme was "Loving Our World".

This day we wore **red** as a symbol of our commitment to stopping violence against Native women & children. **Patricia Tull**, author of the 2024-2025 "Let Justice Roll Down" study presented us with connections between the Bible and the environmental issues of today. Our keynote speaker was **Yung Me Morris**, Spiritual Care & Bereavement Care Coordinator at Heartland Home Care & Hospice. She discussed famine, and the concepts surrounding lack of food for the world. She provided thought provoking ideas and relaxed us with appropriate humor. Prayers of the Community was done by the participants of the **USA Mission Experience 2023 to the US southern border**. Their group prayer was thought provoking and moving. I recommend that you invite Marianne Montero, our PWS Representative, to speak to your group/church about the 2023 mission trip to the border.



Evening Plenary: Theme "Loving Our Neighbors".

Rashell Hunter, author of the 2025-2026 "Finding Resilience" study gave us an insight. Finding Resilience will help us reconnect with God and find our identity. A video presentation of 16 PW Grantees beautifully demonstrated our love of the world, and how Presbyterian Women have helped women and children on almost every continent. It was quite a moving informative show of how our Thank and Birthday Offering funds help the world.



We wore **orange** this day in solidarity with women and girls worldwide who deal with domestic violence. Veda Pendleton, will be the author of the 2026-2027 Horizon's Bible Study. It was not named, she encouraged us to continuing studying the Bible in her greetings message to us.

Laura Cheifetz was the keynote speaker. She reminded us that we must love from the inside and the outside. To do this we must love ourselves, as God loves us. An offering was collected of over \$17,000.00 for our grant recipient "Frontera de Cristo", a non-profit organization that provides various services to people at our southern border. Offering prayer was offered by Christine Casanova, Synod of the Southwest Moderator.



Evening Plenary theme was "Loving Our Community".

At dinner in the Convention Center Ballroom, we shared our stories and played trivia games. The Gift Cards brought to the Gathering by attendees were given to Bethel Hills and Presbyterian Children's Homes and Services. This non-profit provides a combination of programs to service children in foster care, in need of homes, and help in strengthening families. Closing prayer was by **Ruth Fong**, Asian/Asian American Member-at-Large, sending to reflect on all we learned and did these three days. We were sent off with a vision for the future from our new Moderator Pam Snyder, and Vice Moderator Kelsey Law.





Day 4, AM. Our theme was "Loving Out Loud". Cheryl Mayo, Moderator of Presbyterian Women

Synod of Mid-America opened us with joy, and shared highlight videos from the past 3 days of us at the Gathering. The Call to Worship by Moderator Pam **Snyder**, the Prayer of Confession was by Board of Directors Finance Chair 2024-2027 Susan Brooks, and the Assurance of Pardon was by Board of Directors Search Committee Moderator Terri Sherman. Get to know your Search Committee Moderator. She will need help filling positions for the years 2027-2030. Be sure to help her! Our keynote speaker was CeCe Armstrong, Associate Pastor of St.James on James Island, Charleston, SC, and Comoderator of the 226th General Assembly 2024. Her sermon was called "Love Always ..." She reminded us that this love is ours as children of God. and that love forgives, in love we are forgiven, and we are at peace with God and each other. SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT - PSALM 23

Described as a scripture 'for all occasions', Psalm 23 is one of the best-known and most often-quoted and memorized Old Testament passages in the Bible. The renowned American Congregationalist clergyman, Henry Ward Beecher, wrote in part:

"It has charmed more griefs to rest than all the philosophy of the world ... It has comforted the noble host of the poor. It has sung courage to the army of the disappointed. It has poured balm and consolation into the heart of the sick, of captives in dungeons, of widows in their pinching griefs, of orphans in their loneliness. Dying soldiers have died easier as it was read to them; ghastly hospitals have been illuminated. It has visited the prisoner and broken his chains. It has made the dying Christian slave freer than his master and consoled those whom, dying, he left behind mourning, not so much that he was gone, as because they were left behind, and could not go, too."

Below are renderings of this 'familiar' Psalm found in the varying versions of the Bible as well as two contemporary interpretations. I encourage you to take a little time to read each one thoughtfully. You may just gain a new insight into this powerful Psalm! Because of its familiarity, we run the risk of repeating it without giving much thought to its meaning and application to our daily lives.

King James Version (KJV)

The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. ² He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: he leadeth me beside the still waters. ³ He restoreth my soul: he leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake. ⁴Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me. ⁵ Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies: thou anointest my head with oil; my cup runneth over. ⁶ Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life: and I will dwell in the house of the LORD for ever.

The Message (MSG)

¹ God, my shepherd! I don't need a thing. ²You have bedded me down in lush meadows, you find me quiet pools to drink from. ³True to your word, you let me catch my breath and send me in the right direction. ⁴Even when the way goes through Death Valley, I'm not afraid when you walk at my side. Your trusty shepherd's crook makes me feel secure. ⁵You serve me a six-course dinner right in front of my enemies. You revive my drooping head; my cup brims with blessing. ⁶ Your beauty and love chase after me every day of my life. I'm back home in the house of God for the rest of my life.

The New King James Version (NKJV)

New Century Version (NCV)

The Lord is my shepherd; I have everything I need. ² He lets me rest in green pastures. He leads me to calm water. ³ He gives me new strength. He leads me on paths that are right for the good of his name. ⁴ Even if I walk through a very dark valley, I will not be afraid, because you are with me. Your rod and your shepherd's staff comfort me. ⁵ You prepare a meal for me in front of my enemies. You pour oil of blessing on my head; you fill my cup to overflowing. ⁶ Surely your goodness and love will be with me all my life, and I will live in the house of the Lord forever.

The Passion Translation (TPT)

¹ Yahweh is my best friend and my shepherd. I always have more than enough. ² He offers a resting place for me in his luxurious love. His tracks take me to an oasis of peace near the quiet brook of bliss. ³ That's where he restores and revives my life. He opens before me the right path and leads me along in his footsteps of righteousness so that I can bring honor to his name. ⁴ Even when your path takes me through the valley of deepest darkness, fear will never conquer me, for you already have! Your authority is my strength and my peace. The comfort of your love takes away my fear. I'll never be lonely, for you are near. ⁵ You become my delicious feast even when my enemies dare to fight. You anoint me with the fragrance of your Holy Spirit; you give me all I can drink of you until my cup overflows. ⁶ So why would I fear the future? Only goodness and tender love pursue me all the days of my life. Then afterward, when my life is through, I'll return to your glorious presence to be forever with you!

23RD PSALM FOR THE WORKPLACE

The Lord is my real boss, and I shall not want. He gives me peace, when chaos is all around me. He gently reminds me to pray before I speak and to do all things without murmuring and complaining. He reminds me that He is my Source and not my job.

He restores my sanity every day and guides my decisions that I might honor Him in everything I do.

Even though I face absurd amounts of emails, system crashes, unrealistic deadlines, budget cutbacks, gossiping co-workers, discriminating supervisors, and an aging body that doesn't cooperate every morning, I will not stop – for He is with me!

His presence, His peace, and His power will see me through. He raises me up, even when they fail to promote me. He claims me as His own, even when the company threatens to let me go.

His faithfulness and love are better than any bonus check. His retirement plan beats every 401K there is. When it's all said and done, I'll be working for Him a whole lot longer and for that, I bless His Name.


